## Help Small Business

There is undoubtedly an awareness in Washington and Lansing that small business concerns have been in trouble for some time now. There is talk, and we know it's a problem, but there just has not been too much done yet to stop this trend.

Sure, Congress has passed a bill supposed to help small business. It may in some instances, but it won't be much help to small retail businesses, and they need help most. The measure doesn't provide for any reduction in tax rates. It does al-low a firm to reduce its taxable income by deducting an increased percentage of

by deducting an increased percentage or machinery and equipment costs for depre-ciation in the first year after purchase. This help therefore goes mostly to small manufacturers. We'll admit they need it. But so do small retailers, who generally don't have much in the way of machinery or heavy againment. machinery or heavy equipment.

ne senate nas been holding some hearings now and then on another proposal which, while somewhat explosive, world really be of more practical help to small retailers.

That's a bill which would pretty much return "fair trade" to the business scene. We haven't been able to get any details We haven't been able to get any details on this complicated proposal. About all we know is that it was introduced by Senator William Proxmire of Wisconsin and Senator Hubert Humphrey of Minnesota, both Democrats. It is called a federal fair trade law, which would permit manufacturers to set minimum retail prices on their products. Sounds pretty much like the one which has been about battered to death in the last couple of years. death in the last couple of years.

Some people dislike fair trade. But it is the only help which small retailers have ever had in their fight for survival. Help like the bill just passed is really no more than something to which lawmakers can point and say, "look what I did for

Retailers, and this includes some of the larger ones, have really been having a rough time. Many have just quit. Witness the buildings for rent in our area. You'd better not say it makes no difference to you—you didn't trade there any. way. You are affected in several ways. Those stores pay taxes, and keep you from paying more. Those small business men are usually among the most active in community events. Maybe they have only a few employees, but those jobs are needed in the community also. As a practical matter, it's usually much easier to get good service and repair work done on purchases from the smaller business. More people seem now to be realizing that "service after purchase" is very important to the buyer. And more stores are beginning to push that truth as more people understand it. You are affected in several ways. stand it.

We think that fair trade may be on its way back. But it will be some time yet, and meantime the retailer you need may be obliged to give up the ghost because he didn't have fair trade in some critical
