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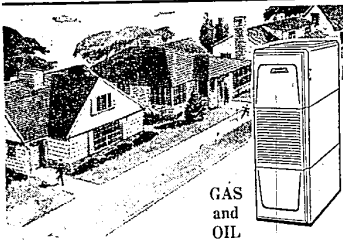
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# At Principals' 'Chewing Match'

Byron Oliver, principal of Duncel Jr. High attended the Principals' "Chewing Match", August 2-3 at Highland Lake. This meeting sponsored by the Michigan Secondary School Association, a Department of the Michigan Education Association, is held each year at the Conservation Training School.

This meeting, in the setting of an informal atmosphere, is designed for an easy exchange of ideas on school matters so one can learn what is being done at other schools of the state. The popularity of this type of meeting during the last several years has increased to the extent that two such meetings were held this year, the other being at the Upper Peninsula which was well attended by high school principals from the Lower Peninsula as well as the Upper Peninsula.

Dr. Fred Fischback of the University of Michigan High Altitude Biology Laboratory who has just returned from Cape Canaveral Launching Base, Florida was the "kick-off" speaker. A representative of the Conservation Department presented a special program on various phases of conservation and conducted a field trip showing methods of conservation.

Harold Logan, Principal of Slauson Junior High School, Ann Arbor, was the director to this year's meeting. Mr. Cecil B. Lillie, Farmington, has completed his fourth class (freshman) year at the United States Merchant Marine Academy, Kings Point, Long Island, New York.

As part of his course at the Academy, he will now be assigned to various ships of the American Merchant Marine for his third class (sophomore) year. While assigned to these ships, Cadet Kosty will go with them as they actively engage in foreign commerce along the shipping lanes of the world.

This year at sea is one of the unique points of the educational program given at the Academy. It gives the individual Cadet an opportunity to learn first hand about the ships upon which he will later serve as an officer.

The ceremonies will mark the 31st commencement of GMI, an engineering college which provided GMI with 25 percent of its engineers.

Riding is among the 373 in the class to receive four year engineering diplomas.

The ceremonies will be held in the evening at Alwood Stadium. Charles A. Chayne, General Motors vice president in charge of the engineering staff, will deliver the commencement address.

# Feels Homes Need Flexibility

"These days we often see pictures of house interiors that leave us with the feeling that if you moved a chair, or even the couch, you would destroy the house," Alden Dow, Midland architect, said at The University of Michigan.

"Personally — and I speak for many humans — I prefer the kind of a living room where you can drop a broom in the middle of the floor and have it look as if it belonged there.

"Clients often have interesting thoughts on the subject of design. Recently I had a client say to me, 'I would like a house that would handle organized clutter. I think this is a wonderful expression and is a true reflection of the American view of a home.'

Dow stressed the importance of organic design. "My father had a thought along this line that has been a real inspiration for me," he said. "If you can see all of a thing from one position, it lacks appeal, or in other words, lacks expression."

"He used this idea in landscape gardening. Lawn areas were always arranged so that they disappeared behind planted areas. A pool of water was never rectangular, but a ribbon path winding its way through planted and open areas. The effect of this is to lead you on because that is the only way to see it, understand it."

"I have found this principle most useful in the planning of buildings. Never make a room a simple rectangle where all is understood at the first glance. If you do you demand nothing from the observer, and hence you get no lasting appeal."

Dow declared, "A good design must respond to three qualities: 1) it must be honest; 2) it must have humility; and 3) it must possess enthusiasm."

"We all understand what is meant by honesty, but it is a complicated subject and every man will put his own interpretation on it. Humility means the ability to give or take gracefully. A building that has humility adds something to the land it sits on and the land in turn contributes to the building."

"The last quality, enthusiasm, means ardent pursuit of expression. An entrance to a building is not just a hole in the wall, but an elaboration of forms all saying — 'This is the entrance.'"

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**Refusing Pay Proves Problem**

When you do a job that you feel is a worthy cause and refuse to accept money for it, you are usually extended a gracious "thank you."

Refusing to accept money for jury duty because you feel it is your duty rather than a job you should get paid for, however, may bring some unexpected complications.

This is what Lloyd R. Johnson of 19726 Lahser, owner of the Whitehall Convalescent Home in Novi, Ann Arbor and Farmington, found out much to his amazement last week.

Called to perform jury duty at a Wayne County Recorder's Court, his request not to get paid set the court buzzing. He was the first man any could recall who had refused pay for this duty and they didn't know what to do.

To be on jury duty for 20 days, normal pay at \$8 per day would mean a salary of \$160 for Johnson. Because of the fact that he would be drawing regular salary during this time, however, Johnson contended that he didn't deserve the money and that it was his duty to serve free.

After much discussion, it was decided to issue Johnson a check and then have him endorse it back to the Wayne County General Fund.
