Timely Tips on GARDENING

RELAX AND PLAN

August days, which are so hot and sultry, are better for relaxing and planning than for active gardening. Some maintenance work is necessary, of course, to keep the garden tidy and blooming well, but the mowing, edging, weeding and spraying should be done in the cool hours of early morning or evening.

Now is the time for the gardener to sit in a shady spot and enjoy the garden. Perennials and annuals are blooming profusely, their blossoms providing brilliant contrasts or subtle color harmonies. Birds are flashing among the flowers and shrubbery busily gathering insects, and a few butterflies are lazily floating about.

It is a good time, too, to read a book or two on gardening.

The new home owner will find a book on landscape planning most helpful.

While relaxing in the garden give it a critical appraisal. Keep a notebook handy and make notes of areas that need improving. Jot down ideas for Fall planting.

If much new planting is contemplated, formulate an overall garden plan. A much more satisfactory garden results when shrubbery and flowers are placed in accordance with a plan, rather than planted helter-skelter according to whim. Plan the entire property, allocating space for service areas, play areas, and sitting areas, as well as shrub borders, flower beds and vegetable plots. After the plan is made, the gardener can set up a schedule for purchasing and planting that will spread the work and cost over a period of several years.

REMEMBERS

Prepare ground for new lawns and allow to settle a bit before seeding. Seeding of new lawns and repair seeding of established lawns is best done the end of August because the warm days then hasten the germination of the seed but the September rains and cooler weather aid the new grass plants in becoming established. If it has not yet been done prune rambling roses, but do not prune climbers until Spring. Blue-seed end root tomatoes, which begin as a small black depress. Rev. John O.
