The Navy's first electrically propelled ship, USS Jupiter, was launched Aug. 24, 1912, at Mare Island, Calif.

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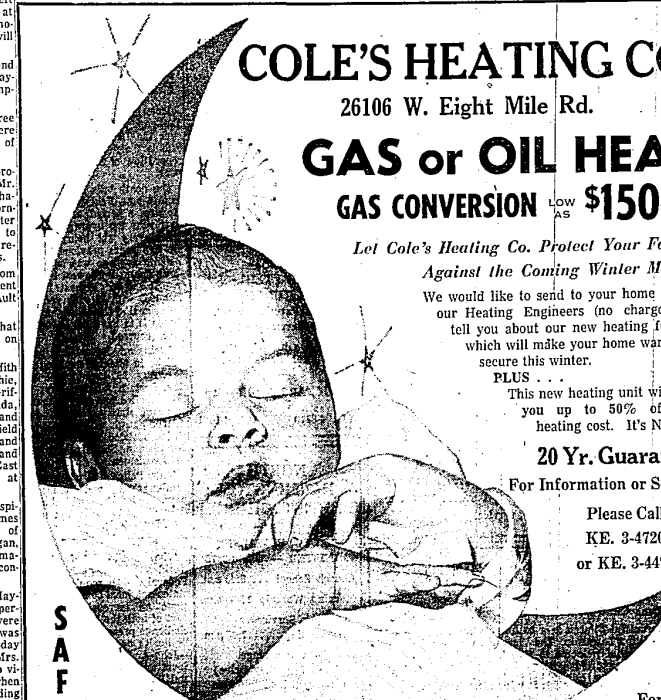
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
