Baptist Bible Conference Opens Sunday

The fall Bible conference of the West Bloomfield Baptist Church, 4909 Orchard Lake Road, begins Sunday morning at 11 a.m. at the Rev. C. W. Stiemming of London, England, brings the first in a series of messages entitled "Facts of Truth from the Tabernacle."
The first message on "The Fellowship of the Tabernacle" will be followed at 7 p.m. with "The Foundation of the Tabernacle." Teaching with the aids of charts and models of the tabernacle and furniture.
Stiemming will continue each week day night at 7:30 with sermons on the "Frame," the "Furniture," and the "Furnishings" of this most important Old Testament institution.
Singing for the conference will be led by Walter W. Morrow. Special music will be brought on the various evenings by the Underwood Trio, the Gospelists Trio, the Ladies trio from First Baptist Church, Pontiac, and the Gospel Echoes Trio from Pontiac First Baptist.
The Rev. Mr. Stiemming has held pastorates in Bangor, North Ireland; Reading; Brighton; London and Uppminster. In 1946 he joined the staff of the Bible Training Fellowship of London as a traveling lecturer; he is now director of this organization which promotes the exposition and study of the Bible and the study of the Holy scriptures.
1949 marked the first visit of Mr. and Mrs. Stiemming to this country; they are now concluding their fourth preaching tour in this continent. A noted authority on Old Testament typology and Palestinian customs, he is the author of six volumes including "The Tabernacle Pattern," a study of the Tabernacle. "These are the Garments" on the apparel of the Levitical priests, and "The Leadership of the Tabernacle" and "The Restored Tabernacle" on the twenty-third Psalm.

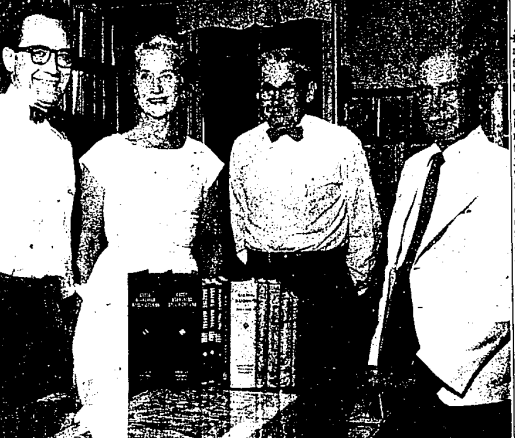

Work on Area Hospital Ahead Of Schedule

Construction of St. Mary Hospital, which is being built by the Felician Sisters at Five Mile Road and Levan Road to serve this area is far ahead of schedule and is planned to be opened late in 1959 instead of early 1960. "We are happy to let the folks know of the fine progress being made," Sister Mary Columbine, administrator of the hospital, stated in her announcement. "And with the earlier targeted date we will be that much closer to the day when we can administer to ailing and provide the hospital services so vitally needed in the area."
According to Sister Columbine, the combination of fine weather and enthusiastic workers has made possible the beating of the time schedule. If the opening date could be advanced slightly, she commented.
The second floor of the five story building is being poured this week and it won't be long until the entire framework of the five story structure is finished. From then on it will be a matter of completing the interior.
"We are hopeful that the framework can be advanced to the point," Sister Columbine continued, "where the coming of the cold weather will not retard the workers as they then will be able to continue indoors in comfort."
Sister Columbine also stated that, while the preliminary plans call for a five story structure, the foundation has been tested and has proven strong enough to add five more stories when they are needed.
St. Mary Hospital will open as a 174-bed institution and is being built at a cost of more than \$3,000,000. It is to serve the communities of Livonia, Redford Township, Farmington, Northville, Plymouth and Plymouth Township, Wixom and Novi.
Plans are already in progress to increase the size to 350 beds within the course of the next few years if conditions warrant the addition.
"We will have one of the finest institutions of its kind in the middle west," Sister Columbine explained. "It will be the latest design and will have the very latest in equipment and facilities. We are looking forward with a great deal of anticipation for the day when its doors will be opened to alleviate suffering humanity."

Families to Turn Earth for 1st Parish Unit

Seventy-five families of the congregation will participate in ground-breaking services for the new Lutheran Church of the Shepherd King, Middlebelt and West Maple Road, Sunday, September 7, at 10:30 a.m.
Each family will bring its own shovel to assist in turning the first earth for the new, first Lutheran parish building. A circle of earth will be turned, symbolizing the fellowship of faith which binds the families of the church in one.
The service will be conducted by Rev. A. Karl Boehmke, pastor of the mission congregation. The church choir under the direction of Fifth Grade will sing. David T. Schweick, chairman of the building committee.
Architect for the \$105,000 contemporary structure is Charles Stades Associates of Park Ridge, Ill. General contractor is the Melvin Lodge Co. of Bloomfield. The building will house a nave seating 175 worshippers, with overflow space for an additional 125. Sunday school rooms, activity space, kitchen, offices and baptistry are also included in the single-level plan.
The congregation, organized in December, 1956, is meeting temporarily in the Eagle School, West 14 Mile and Middlebelt Road. Sunday school, Bible study and worship services are held regularly at 9 and 10:30 a.m.
