A Christian Science teacher and practitioner, Rieke is a graduate of Northwestern University. He entered the public practice of Christian Science dealing in 1928. He became an authorized teacher of Christian Science in 1946. He is a native of Fort Wayne, Indiana.

Evangelist to Spark Rally

The Southfield Community Church, 21222 Indian Street (near Eight Mile and Inkster), is resuming its fall schedule of rallies for youth and adults with special meetings by evangelist Billy Walker, a young man with an appropriate message for these times.

The Billy Walker meetings will continue each night except Sunday at 7:30 with special music featured each night. Gary Moore will be singing on Friday, September 19th. The Walker meetings will conclude on Sunday, September 21st.

U.F. Advisory Committee Meets Recently

Louis C. Lundstrom, director of the General Motors Proving Grounds, Milford, heads the U.F. advisory committee representing 12 Oakland County townships in this region on matters concerning the Metropolitan Detroit United Foundation, it was announced last week.

The announcement follows a recent meeting of the advisory body, whose 32 members include representatives from Farmington City and Township, Mrs. Fred Harrison, 2358 Whittington; Mrs. Clarence E. Hill, 2350 Hillcrest; Robert J. Clarke, 22323 Lilac; Mrs. Frank Cotton, 30605 Toward Road, and Vern Wilcox, 3010 Glenhurst.

Other townships represented in the committee are Addison, Commerce, Groveland, High and Holly, Lyon, Milford, Novi, Ross, Springfield and White Lake.

Lundstrom was chapter chairman for the 12 townships last year in the United Foundation's annual Torch Drive, which supports 195 welfare and health agencies serving them and the Oakland-Macomb-Wayne counties. 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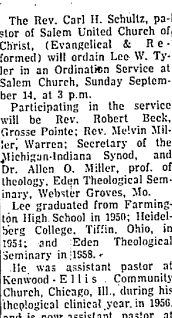
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Local Man To Be Ordained At Salem Church Sunday
