The Junior Varsity football team, coached by Mr. Leo Kempf, are preparing for their first game scheduled at South Lyons for October 7.

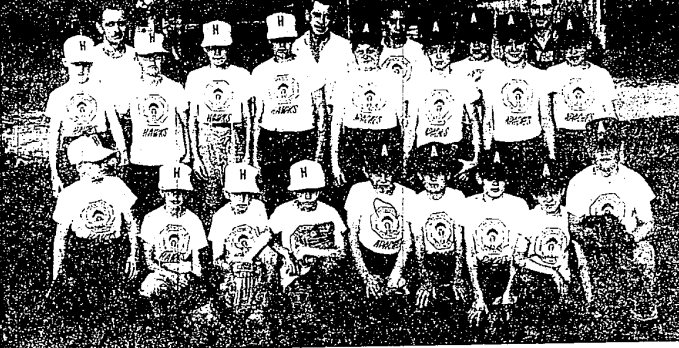
There are 25 candidates out for the team and among them are some outstanding prospects from the Junior High, Kempf said.

## Looking for 2 Big Brothers For Local Boys

Big Brothers of Oakland County, Inc. is seeking help for two Farmington boys at this time.

"In fact, we have been looking for two men to serve as Big Brothers for these local boys for some time," he said.

"A Big Brother is a man who, working in cooperation with professional social workers in general, attempts to build up a friendship with a troubled boy, and at the same time to break down his resentment toward adults in general. For these reasons they cannot be reached through the usual 'group work' sources. Above all, the lad must have a feeling of acceptance and belonging. The Big Brother answers this need by merely being a real friend to the boy. His roll is not to attempt casework with the boy, or even lead him, but to accept him."

"The guiding principle of the Big Brother work is 'one man to one boy.' It is an entirely different and personal approach to the difficult problems of delinquency. The casework is done by social workers in the office with the boy's families through office interviews and emergency calls.

A prospective Big Brother is thoroughly prepared by a two lecture orientation course which is conducted by the director, and an active Big Brother.
