This goal was reached because of the planning program and the support of the Board of Education in the building of over 100 school rooms between 1955 and 1958. In March of 1958 the voters approved an additional \$1,500,000 in Building and Site Bonds which will be used to build additional classrooms to keep pace with projected growth. Although the operating funds of the School District showed a deficit of \$92,102.41 on June 30, 1958, the elections for July 1958, approved an additional tax rate of 5.00 mills for operation for five years. Japanese Exchange Student Finds Life Here Much Different

The American Field Service student exchange program is again sponsoring a student at Clarenceville High School this year.

With the opening of school, the Seniors welcomed Chizuko Hada, a Japanese girl, to the class. Chizuko, better known by her preferred American name of "Joy", came from Osaka, Japan. She is living with Mr. and Mrs. Charles Pierce in Livonia.

Joy attended a private high school in Osaka for 11 1/2 years. When she returns to Japan, she will continue high school for a half year and then be graduated. She was notified about her trip to America on April 26, after having taken three examinations.

Miss Hada has no brothers or sisters and she left only one parent in Japan - her mother. After Joy finishes school in America, she is going to work in the office of a business firm.

Responses to questions asked during her interview proved to be quite interesting. Joy is gradually becoming westernized, said Joy and like herself, many are turning Christian. Although the rest of her ancestors were Buddhists, Joy was converted by a Mormon missionary while attending her high school.

Her opinion of America was much the same as other visitors. "America is noisy, always going and going," she said. Things that bother her most in school are the slacker and the math teachers and Americans dating at such young ages. Joy's favorite food in America is ice cream.
