The team is made up of twelve boys and is coached by Coach Bob Burch. The team has been practicing hard and is looking forward to a good showing at the meet.

There are 20 boys on the team this far and Coach Freed said, "If there are any boys who wish to come out now, we will gladly take them. None of the 20 boys will be going home."

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### Survey Nearby Area Soon On Community College Needs

Melvin Kuehn of Clarenceville Public School district, was named last week as a lay member of a survey committee needed for a proposed community college. Appointment was by the board of education.

An earlier meeting involved six school districts and some university experts, and it was decided to begin immediately a survey of the local high school students to determine exact potential need.

Cecil Alford of Livonia was named a full-time "Community College" Coordinator. The six districts include: River Avenue, Tuesday, September 23. Basic purpose is to provide college education (and in some places, technical trade training) within commuting distance of home.

FINANCING of the college would be shared by the districts.

In Michigan enrollment of the various colleges range from 197 at Alpena to 6,400 in Flint and Dearborn.
