The pastor of the church, Rev. Melvin R. Walter, stated that the building was designed by Architect Glen Bickerstaff of Pittsburgh, Pa., and is to be built by the Carlsday Construction Company and would be completed near the first of the year. The first unit will consist of a Chapel plus a split level Educational wing.
The congregation is temporarily holding services in the Bond Grade School, corner of 13 Mile and Orchard Lake Roads.

To Consider New Parsonage
Members of Franklin Community Church are to meet at a Special Quarterly Conference on Wednesday evening, October 1st, to take steps relative to the purpose of the erection of a new parsonage for the Church.
In asking for this special meeting, the Board of Trustees of the Church, headed by D. James Crawford, are asking permission to sell the present parsonage on German Mill Road and erect a new home to serve as the parsonage of the Church.
This would mark the obtaining of a third parsonage in the history of the 118 year old congregation. The original parsonage was located opposite the old church in the home now occupied by the Henry Weed family on German Mill Road and at the end of World War I, the present parsonage, next door to the Dunkel Jr. High School, was erected.
The need for a new parsonage reflects the need for greater space in modern living and for a home in keeping with the present growth of the community.
The meeting will be presided over by the Rev. Everett K. Seymour, M.D., who is the District Superintendent of the Methodist Church. The meeting begins at 8:00 p.m. in the Youth Room of the Church and is open to the entire membership of the Church.

Franklin Church School to Split
Franklin Community Church announces a major change in Church School hours effective Sunday, September 28th.
As of that date, instead of having the entire Church School meet at the same time at 10:00 a.m. or as before, pupils in 4th grade through Junior High will remain after Church and their session will start at 11:15 and last until 12:15.
It is possible that later on, classes for high school and adult peoples will be designed at this later hour.
This change in schedule was agreed by the rapid growth of the Church School which has more than quadrupled in enrollment in a period of only a few months. The congregation moved to its new site on Franklin's Village Green, Church officials said. It had previously been housed in the Church School building which had no room for the great influx and would not need to shift hours until the new wing of the church, scheduled for early construction, was complete.
However, the response on Ray's Day was such that many classes had to meet in the room assigned to them and the shift in hours seemed the only logical solution.

Door-to-Door Census Slated
A door-to-door census of all homes in this Catholic Archdiocese comprising eight counties will begin October 5 and continue through October 15, according to Cardinal Mooney, Archbishop of Detroit, disclosed this week.
The eight counties in the Archdiocese are Washtenaw, Oakland, Macomb, Monroe, Washtenaw, Lapeer and St. Clair.
The first five, forming the Detroit residential area, experienced a tremendous population growth since 1950 necessitating a census of this kind at this time, Archbishop Mooney stated.
The objectives of the census, it was indicated, are to determine:
1. As accurately as is humanly possible the number of Catholics residing in the area.
2. The number of Catholic children in public schools; how many are attending catechetical classes; how many are in the parish.
3. The number of pre-school children, to permit projecting for future needs.
4. Population trends to permit planning for future needs.

Local Church Group Adopts Small Greek Girl

The Women's Association of the First Presbyterian Church, 26165 Farmington Road, Farmington, has financially "adopted" Evanggella Valma, a seven-year-old Greek girl, through Foster Parents' Plan, Inc., 3204 Fourth Avenue, New York City.
The Foster Parents Plan have promised to contribute \$15 a month toward the child's support for at least one year.
Foster Parents' Plan, which was rehabilitated more than 16,000 children on a personal basis since its founding in 1937, is now helping 11,500 youngsters in Greece, South Korea, France, Belgium, Viet Nam and in the DP camps of West Germany. Over the past twenty years, more than 300,000 individuals have helped needy children overseas through Foster Parents' Plan.

Before the second World War Evanggella's family was fairly happy, leading a quiet peaceful life. Her father was a fish peddler and earned enough money to support his family adequately. But with the outbreak of the war the family was stricken with a great misfortune. During the bombing of the port of Piraeus, the child's father was seriously wounded and as a result he lost his left leg and four fingers of his left hand. Since that fateful day the family has known only misery. The father is unable to work and to add to his woes he also suffers from diabetes. Life has become a desperate struggle for existence for the Valmas.

Evanggella, her father, mother, brother Nikolaos (now 21) and her sister Angeliki (now 13), occupy one small room in a house that is in very bad condition. For this month they pay \$5.13 a month for rent. The "home" contained only the minimum of furniture and until PLAN came to the rescue there was virtual starvation. Because of the family's utter destitution Evanggella's sister Maria (now 11) lives with a friend's family who is taking care of her. She has another sister, Stella (now 10), who lives at Athens—where she works as a maid. Her mother is unable to help her for her family at all. Angeliki is an apprentice dressmaker but as she does not earn any money.

The child's father receives a monthly pension from the government as a war victim amounting to \$19.50 a month. This pension which provides children with no bedding or clothing. Nikolaos who had been working otherwise made destitute with no working; he is in the hospital support of the Foster Parents' Plan, and as suffering from typhoid fever, rheumatism and is unable to go to work. This insufficient income cannot begin to provide least one year. Of this sum, the enough food for the family for child receives \$8 each month as

an outright cash grant. The remainder is used for periodic food and new clothing packages, translations of letters, medical services and education. Because each child is treated as an individual, any special needs of the child or his family are taken care of by Plan from its General Fund. This fund is made up of contributions from the public.
To encourage a warm, personal relationship between the Foster Parent and "his child," the Foster Parent receives a history of the child and a photograph and correspondence through the Plan office is translated both ways. This exchange bridges the gap between Foster Parent and child and gives the youngster the feeling of security and love he needs.
It is the task of the sturdy pioneer to hew the tall oak and to cut the rough granite. Future ages must declare what the pioneer has accomplished. —Mary Baker Eddy
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
