Sealed bids for the purchase of notes of said school district of the par value of \$650,000.00 will be received by the undersigned at the County Office of Education, 32000 Michigan Street, Farmington, Michigan, until 8:00 o'clock P.M., Eastern Standard Time, on the 13th day of October, 1958, at which time and place they will be publicly opened and read.

The notes will be dated October 15, 1958 will mature July 15, 1959 and will bear interest at a rate or rates not exceeding 2 1/2% per annum. Both interest and principal will be payable at the option of the issuer.

For the purpose of awarding the notes the interest cost of each bid will be computed by determining, at the rate or rates specified therein, the total dollar value of all interest on the notes from November 1, 1958, to their maturity and deducting therefrom any premium. The notes will be awarded to the bidder whose bid on the above computation produces the lowest interest cost to the school district. No proposal for the purchase of less than all of the notes or at a price less than their par value will be considered.

The loan is in anticipation of undistributed state appropriations for the school year 1958-59, and the full faith and credit of the district is pledged.

A certified or cashier's check in the amount of 2% of the par value of the notes drawn upon an incorporated bank or trust company and payable to the order of the State treasurer of the school district must accompany each bid as a guarantee of good faith on the part of the bidder. Checks of unsuccessful bidders will be promptly returned.

Bids shall be conditioned upon the unqualified opinion of the purchaser's attorney approving the legality of the notes, to be secured at the purchaser's expense. The purchaser shall furnish notes ready for execution at his expense. Executed notes will be delivered at the Office of the Board of Education, 32000 Thomas Street, Farmington, Michigan.

The right is reserved to reject any and all bids. Envelopes containing the bids should be plainly marked "Proposal for Notes."

Says Barricading of Roads Illegal

The barricading of Lila Street was again the agenda of the City Council meeting Monday night. The petition used to close Lila Street is over two years old and it has certainly become obsolete since some of the signers have moved or sold.

Mr. Grose brought before the council an open letter signed by a large number of residents of Lila, some of who signed the original petition, asking that Lila be reopened to the general public. The legality of the so called petition was asked and the names questioned. Representatives in favor of the reopening of Lila were undoubtedly trying to influence those who signed the Grose letter.

What better indication is there as to public sentiment than that proved last Friday night when expelled barricade poles were pulled.

The City Ordinance clearly states that — "That City of Farmington Ordains . . . and methods of protecting and safeguarding the economic structure of the community necessary for the common benefit. 1.50-Street. . . A thoroughfare or way over land set apart for public travel, 1.50-Private Street. . . A thoroughfare or way, not open for use by the general public."

The mayor, when questioned as to whether Lila was a public or private street stated that it was a public street, the barricades disprove his statement. Why, then, is the rest of the city being made to help maintain a private road? In fact three private roads — Violet, Lila and Hawthorne.

The city is getting gasoline tax per capita based on census. The state says that if these funds are to help maintain a road, that road must be open to the general public.

Councilman Bates stated that he was personally opposed to all barricades but that Fink was a dead-end but whether Lila is or not and the answer is, No! Not when it opens onto another street, regardless of whether it is a county dirt road or not.
