Coming "Martin Luther" Film Shot On Authentic German Locations
 Plans are moving ahead for the showing of "Martin Luther," Louise de Rochemont Associates half-million-dollar feature film on Oct. 20th at 6:30 p.m. in Farmington Jr. High School.
 The film was shot on location in Western Germany to guarantee as authentic an atmosphere as possible for the historically-documented picture.
 Dealing with the life of the 16th century Protestant Reformation leader, the film takes Luther from his beginning as a monk in an Augustinian monastery to the world-shaking Diet of Augsburg, when he learns that the evangelistic princes will stand by him in their convictions.
 A production caravan, consisting of a cast and crew of 150 persons riding in cars and buses, followed by several trailer trucks loaded with equipment and costumes, traveled out West to Germany shooting scenes of Luther's student days, the burning of the papal bull and the gale entrance of Luther into the Diet of Worms.
 Most of the action of the film was photographed in the actual streets, churches, monasteries and castles of the period. Since the town of Wittenberg, in whose church Luther preached, is now in the hands of the Russians, the Maulbronn monastery church was used instead. However, the company managed to shoot exteriors of one Eastern Zone location, Wartburg, Thuringia, where Luther was placed in hiding.
