

Walled Lake Will be Falcons Big Test

The Farmington Falcons will be put to the big test this Friday afternoon when they meet the Walled Lake Vikings in a game which could well decide the Inter Lakes Conference champions for this year.

As this will be Farmington's homecoming game, the Falcons will be going all out for victory in the contest which will get underway at 3:30 p.m. at the senior high athletic field.

Picked as the team to beat in the Inter-Lakes Conference this year, Walled Lake has scored impressive victories in their first league games. In their 1-0 victory over the Farmington Bulldogs last Friday, 23-6.

If Southfield can be used as a test, the Falcons will have their hands full. In the Farmington-Southfield game, it should be recalled, it was anybody's contest until the closing minutes when Farmington emerged victorious.

If over a football game was played in one half, it was last Friday night's game in which Farmington romped over Waterford 42 to 6.

It was a very undisciplined first half which ended in a 0 to 0 stalemate.

The Falcons showed none of the offensive or defensive strength displayed in their games until the second half.

of offensive and defensive power which put them on top of a 14-2 score.

Taking the second half kickoff at Walled Lake, Farmington took the lead in the first quarter with a 14-0 lead. The Falcons scored on a 40 yard pass from Mike Agee, a 14 yard pass from Alan Le Sage to Tom Grimshaw, and the scoring play a 20 yard sprint by Agee.

Harvey Chapman, who had six for six for the night, kicked the extra point giving Farmington a 7 to 0 lead.

Waterford then watched the Farmington kickoff out to the bounds on their own 40 yard line. The Skippers scored on a 15 yard pass from Mike Agee, a 15 yard loss after another interception. The Skippers were forced to punt.

At play later, Le Sage broke another score on a 30 yard run by Grimshaw, a 15 yard run by Dan Goodfellow, and the scoring

yard line setting the scene for the next touchdown, a 50 yard dash by fullback Neil Stevenson. Stevenson kicked to the Skippers seven yard line and two plays later, the Skippers dropped the ball on their own 13 yard line and the Falcons recovered it.

After a pass attempt, which did not hit, Le Sage, quarterback, ran the right end for 13 yards and the Falcons third score.

The Skippers took Stevenson's kickoff to their own 31 yard line. They marched the remaining 69 yards for their only score of the game. The Skippers went in on the 30 yard pass play. The extra point was blocked however.

Farmington was not yet satisfied. They took the short Waterford kick and marched in for another score on a 30 yard run by Grimshaw, a 15 yard run by Dan Goodfellow, and the scoring

play a 10 yard run by Ron Rappree was equally matched by their strong defense. John Dempsey, Frank Clappison, Daniel Ressler and George Fawcett were sighted by Douglas Race, line coach, for outstanding defensive play.

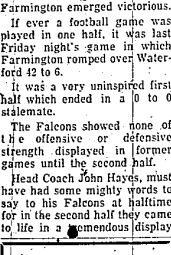
Cross-Country Team Humbled

In a bruising defensive battle last Friday afternoon, the Clarenceville Trojans were edged 7-6 by Bloomfield Hills on the Barons' home field.

The Falcons have outscored their four opponents 128-33 so far this season. Al LeSage, Neil Stevenson and Mike Agee added to the FT total with 18 and 18 at Waterford. Dan Goodfellow and Ron Rador also added a bit of lustre to the second string backfield with their touchdown drives.

Harvey "The Toe" Chapman kicked six perfect extra points against Waterford. He now has made good on 13 out of 17 extra point attempts. One of those misses can be attributed to a wobbly pass from center. Another miss was blocked. Harvey is also the scoring leader on the team with a total of 31 points. Stevenson and LeSage trail with 24. Goodfellow and Agee have 18 and Jordan and Rador each have six.

A call by an official in the fourth quarter could have caused quite a ruckus had the score been close. After Farmington's fifth touchdown, the Falcons kicked to the Waterford 20 yard line where a Skipper back attempted to pick up the ball and very obviously kicked out of bounds. The official, assuming the ball had gone out without being touched, placed it on the 40 yard line. Coach Hayes protested that mildly but was lead at the time tempered his feelings considerably.

The Falcon reserves showed great promise when they took over during much of the latter part of the game. Dan Goodfellow and Don Rador scored touchdowns. Bessery and Dave Crouse, contributed with a pass interception that set up the Falcons last touchdown. Jerry Kelly also did well in his first stint at quarterback.

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
