Complete New Line of Plymouths On Display at Farmington Sales

The completely new 1959 Plymouth line of cars is now on display at Farmington Sales and Service at 33224 Grand River.

The 28 models which went on display today, Thursday, across the nation include the new Sports Fury series which provides front seat seats as standard equipment. These swivel seats are also optional on four other models.

In addition to the Sport Fury, Plymouth also offers the Fury, Belvedere and Savoy series.

SEVERAL new "value" features have been included in the 1959 line of Plymouths which provide greater economy of operation, a company spokesman said. A new three-stage carburetor, standard on all V-6 models, reduces consumption at middle speed ranges where "most driving is done. A new rear axle gas ratio is also offered to give further gas mileage.

Village Without Vote Questioned

Dear Sir:

I have made the wrong interpretation of the article relating to the village of Farmington, Michigan, which appeared in the last edition of the Enterprise, and it is true that the village of Farmington is not a village. The plan will ask the Oakland County Board of Supervisors for an order which would create a village without a vote of the people.

If I am wrong I will welcome correction. If I am not wrong I hope that all the people in this area realize that they may be forced into village status without the right to elect their own supervisors. As I understand it the supervisors, by resolution, would create the village and then they would draw up a charter which would then be submitted to the residents for approval. If this is the intent of the petitioners, I am overwhelmed by their plan.

Of decency. Even though the right to follow this course is contained in an archaic law written in 1895 it, nevertheless, makes a mockery of our democratic system, and it is inconceivable to me that the members of the Board of Supervisors would take action to disenfranchise the voters on a question so important to them.

Just in case my interpretation is correct, I would like to point out that the proposed incorporation area is bounded by Eleven Mile Rd., Farmington Rd., Eight Mile Rd., and Haggerty To anyone living in this territory, who would be opposed to this plan I would suggest they contact the petitioners and get the true story. I will be hoping for someone to tell me how mistaken I am about the matter.
