

CITY OF FARMINGTON, COUNTY OF OAKLAND, STATE OF MICHIGAN.

A Regular Meeting of the City Council of the City of Farmington, County of Oakland, State of Michigan, held on October 6, 1958, at 8:00 o'clock p.m., at the City Hall in said City.

PRESENT: Councilmen Barber, Bates, Brotherton, Cavasagh, Lindbergh.

ABSENT: Councilman None.

The following preamble and resolution were offered by Councilman Barber and adopted by the City Council of the City of Farmington, County of Oakland, State of Michigan, on October 6, 1958:

RESOLUTION. Be it resolved, that the City of Farmington, County of Oakland, State of Michigan, do hereby adopt the following resolution:

WHEREAS, it is necessary to amend said resolution to increase the maximum rate of interest at which said bonds are offered for sale;

AND WHEREAS, it is necessary to amend said resolution to increase the maximum rate of interest at which said bonds are offered for sale;

BE IT RESOLVED, That the City of Farmington, County of Oakland, State of Michigan, do hereby amend the resolution adopted May 3, 1958, by the City Council of the City of Farmington, County of Oakland, State of Michigan, to read as follows:

4. Said bonds shall be designated 1958 MOTOR VEHICLE HIGHWAY FUND BONDS and shall consist of sixty-five (65) bonds of the denomination of \$1,000.00 each, numbered consecutively in direct order of maturity from 1 to 65, both inclusive, dated as of July 1, 1958, and payable semi-annually thereafter on the first day of July and January of each year, upon presentation and surrender of the proper interest coupons hereto annexed as they shall mature, and interest on said bonds and interest on this bond are payable in lawful money of the United States of America, and the prompt payment of this bond and interest thereon, interest, the full faith, credit and resources of the City of Farmington, County of Oakland, State of Michigan, are hereby irrevocably pledged.

This bond is one of a series of sixty-five (65) bonds of even date and maturity, except as to date of maturity, aggregating the principal sum of \$65,000.00, issued pursuant to the authority of Act 155, Public Act of Michigan, 1952, as amended, and pursuant to resolution of the City of Farmington, County of Oakland, State of Michigan, adopted May 3, 1958, as amended, for the purpose of defraying the cost of the improvement of certain major streets of the City.

Bonds of this issue numbered 1 to 40, inclusive, maturing in the years 1959 to 1963, both inclusive, shall not be subject to redemption prior to maturity.

Bonds numbered 41 to 65, both inclusive, maturing in the years 1964 to 1968, both inclusive, shall be subject to redemption prior to maturity, at the option of the City of Farmington, County of Oakland, State of Michigan, on or after July 1, 1958, at par and accrued interest, plus a premium of 10%.

\$20.00 on each bond called for redemption prior to July 1, 1970; \$15.00 on each bond called for redemption on or after July 1, 1970, but prior to July 1, 1972; \$10.00 on each bond called for redemption on or after July 1, 1972, inclusive, at the option of the City, in inverse order of call order, on any interest payment date on or after July 1, 1968, at par and accrued interest, plus a premium of 10%.

5. Said bonds and the attached coupons shall be in substantial conformity with the following form:
