Kensington Will Set New Record

Kensington Park bids fair to top its all time high attendance record of 1,608,000 set in 1936, according to David Laidlaw, park superintendent. Attendance figures through September were 1,524,000, already topping a high 1937 twelve-month total of 1,450,000.

For the first nine months of 1938, 53,208 persons were served through guided hikes, Nature Center tours, and lectures. Registered at the Nature Center were 38,433 through September. With October figures added to date, the Nature Center attendance already is considerably over 40,000.

Free nature education service was instituted by the Huron Metropolitan Authority in 1933 with one naturalist, Bill Hopkins, who now heads the department with two full-time aides, Charles Damm and Rainier Brooke, and part-time aides in summer. They serve not only Kensington but all five Huron-Clington Park, other being Metropolitan) B e a c h, Marshbank (near Pontiac), Dexter-Huron (near Ann Arbor) and Lower Huron near Belleville and Plymouk.
