Plan Scooter Motor Corps

Graduates of the motor scooter driver training program now being conducted here will be eligible for membership in a civilian defense motor scooter messenger corps.

Earl Teeples, Farmington township police patrolman and instructor at the township "scooter school" here, said he planned a complete course of instruction in first aid, police work, fire fighting and communications for the prospective emergency scooter riders.

"Scooters can get through on roads or areas blocked to larger vehicles because of debris," Teeples explained.

"In the event of disaster, this would be all-important," Teeples said.

Teeples said scooter school students would be told of the messenger corps at the third meeting of the school this Thursday, from 7 to 9 p.m. at Dunack High School, 12 Mile and Farmington Roads.

Seventy teen-agers have enrolled in the class, which will conclude with a scooter road race, a Gasman motor scooter race and the awarding of the first place trophy.

In an exciting last quarter, the J. V. Trojans of Clarenceville High triumphed over Milford's Redskins by a score of 13-7.

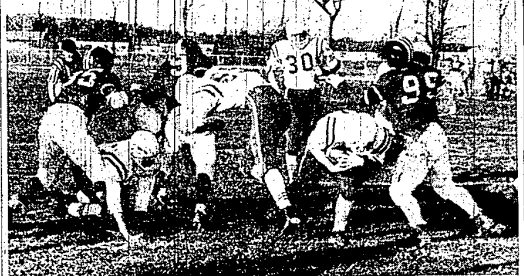
The first and third quarters were scoreless with the Redskins scoring in the second.

The Farmington Falcons gave a good demonstration last Friday of why they are rated among the top ten high school football teams in the state this year. (The Associated Press rated them as eighth best prior to last Friday's game.)

Using reserves freely in the closing minutes of the first half and throughout the remainder of the game, the Falcons went on to a ten-point scoring rampage to humiliate Van Dyke, 68-0, and sew up the Inter-Lakes Conference championship.

The Falcons now have but one game—a contest with the neighboring rival Clarenceville Trojans Friday night at Clarenceville—standing in their way of an undefeated season.

The opening kickoff against Van Dyke was an indication of things to come as Neil Stevenson kicked the ball right out of the end zone.

After getting the ball on the 20, the Abes were unable to move and were forced to punt. The kick went out of bounds on the 20 and Farmington took over.

Two plays later, the Falcons took to the air with quarterback Mike Agee hitting straightback Tom Grimshaw for 42 yards. The play put the ball on the two yard line of Van Dyke. On the second play, Tom Grimshaw sneaked over for the score. Harvey "The Toe" Chapman converted the extra point.

Van Dyke could not seem to hang onto the ball for any length of time throughout the game. Consequently, Farmington dominated the offensive all day.

The Falcons' second score resulted from a Van Dyke fumble in their own territory. Tailback Mike Agee claimed the score with a nine yard plunge. Chapman's point after put the Falcons on top 14-0.

An unmovable Falcon defense forced the Abes to punt three times after they received the kickoff. On the first play, the Falcons again took to the air.
