LEGAL NOTICE

CIVIL DEFENSE.
An ordinance to establish a Civil Defense Township, to create the office of Director of Civil Defense, to provide for the training of citizens to minimize and relieve damage and hardship resulting from enemy attack, and to provide for the full implementation of such plans to define the powers and duties of Civil Defense and to provide penalties for violation thereof.

In accordance with the authority granted to the Township of Farmington by Act 154, amended, and in order to establish an organization to fulfill the responsibilities granted and imposed upon the said Township by the said Act 154, amended, **THE TOWNSHIP OF FARMINGTON ORDAINS:**

Section 1. Civil Defense Organization.
A. The Supervisor shall exercise general direction and control over the Civil Defense Organization of Farmington Township. All persons in charge of the organization shall be responsible to the Supervisor for organization, training and other duties of said Organization. In the event that the Civil Defense Organization is mobilized because of an enemy or natural disaster as defined in said Act 154, the Supervisor shall assume direct control of all segments of said Organization, such authority to be exercised through the Director of Public Safety and the Director of Civil Defense.

B. The Civil Defense Organization shall consist of the following:
1. Police and fire fighting services existing in the Township and Police Departments and including auxiliary police and fire departments under the direction of the Director of Public Safety.
2. All other volunteer emergency services which may be organized on Farmington Township, under the direction of the Director of Civil Defense.
3. All other emergency services, shall include but are not limited to the following:
(a) Medical and hospital services.
(b) Air raid wardens.
(c) Welfare services.
(d) Engineering services.
(e) Transportation services.

Section 2. Powers and Duties of the Supervisor.
A. The Supervisor shall be responsible for the organization and training of civil defense forces in Farmington Township. It shall be his responsibility to carry out his responsibilities properly, he shall have the following powers and authority:
1. He may delegate to the Director of Civil Defense or to the Director of Public Safety, or to any other person, any or all of the duties of the Civil Defense Organization at any reasonable time for training purposes.
2. He may conduct public practice alerts and/or air raid emergencies to insure the efficient operation of the Civil Defense Organization and to familiarize the citizens of Farmington Township with civil defense regulations and proceed in accordance with such regulations. He may adopt such reasonable regulations as may be necessary for the conduct of such practice alerts.

3. Subject to such budget which may be approved by the Township Board, he may purchase such civil defense materials and supplies which may be necessary to the carrying out of the functions of the Civil Defense Organization.
4. He shall have such other powers and authority as may be necessary to the development of an efficient Civil Defense Organization.
5. In the event of attack or natural disaster as defined in said Act 154 of the Public Acts of 1953, amended, the Supervisor shall immediately mobilize and assume command of the Civil Defense Organization. At such time he shall also forthwith convene the Township Board to perform such emergency duties as the situation shall demand. When so convened the Township Board shall remain in session until, in his opinion, the emergency has passed.
6. In the event of attack or natural disaster as defined in said Act 154, the Supervisor shall have the following emergency powers:
1. Upon the order of the Governor or the state director of civil defense or his authorized representative, he shall assign and make available for duty the Civil Defense Organization with or outside the physical limits of Farmington Township.
2. He may request aid from state, county or other local civil defense force if, in his opinion, conditions in the township are such as to require such aid. He is authorized to request the Civil Defense Organization of Farmington Township.
3. Subject to the power of the Township Board to amend or repeal, he may promulgate such reasonable regulations as may be necessary to protect life and property and to preserve critical resources, such as regulations necessary to restrict or facilitate the movement of vehicles and persons from critical areas to persons and property from attack.

4. He shall exercise such further emergency powers as may be granted by the Township Board.
Section 3. Director of Civil Defense.
There shall be a Director of Civil Defense who shall be appointed by the Township Board and shall receive such remuneration as the Township Board shall direct. Such Director may be removed by the Township Board or by the Governor or the state director of civil defense. Such Director shall be responsible for administration and training of the Civil Defense Organization in Farmington Township under the direction of the Supervisor. His duties shall include:
A. Development of plans for the coordinated utilization of all the resources and facilities of the township for civil defense.
B. Recruiting and coordinating volunteer personnel and agencies for civil defense purposes.
C. Preparing and administering educational programs to prepare the citizens of the township for protection in case of attack or natural disaster.
D. Developing or causing to be developed, mutual aid agreements with other public and private agencies within the township for protection in case of attack or natural disaster too great to be dealt with unassisted. Such authority shall be exercised in cooperation with the Oakland County, Michigan, Civil Defense Board.
E. Negotiating with owners or persons in control of buildings or other property for the use of such buildings or property for civil defense purposes and designating suitable buildings as public shelters.
F. Assuming such other similar duties as the Supervisor shall delegate to promote and execute the civil defense plan.

Section 4. Unauthorized display of insignia.
A. It shall be a violation of

any ordinance for any person to display any identifying civil defense insignia for any purpose other than that for which it was intended or under circumstances not authorized by the Supervisor.
B. It shall also be a violation of this ordinance for any person to wear or display in any manner, any insignia, sign or device purported to be a civil defense insignia except when such insignia has been duly issued by the Director of Civil Defense and is displayed in accordance with regulations established by the Director of Civil Defense.

Section 5. Intent of Ordinance.
It is the intent of the within ordinance to carry out the purposes of said Act 154 and the provisions of said Act, insofar as they are applicable to Farmington Township, and hereby incorporated herein. Nothing in this ordinance shall be so construed as to conflict with any provision of said Act 154, if reenacted in adopting this ordinance that the Civil Defense Organization of Farmington Township is a part of the Oakland County civil defense organization, and that to that extent shall be subject to the control and authority of the Oakland County Board of Supervisors and/or the Oakland County director of civil defense.

Section 6. Penalty.
Any violation of the provi-

This ordinance shall be effective when adopted by the Township Board and when so adopted after thirty (30) days have elapsed after the first publication of said ordinance.
