

Reign As Undeclared, Untied Champions

The highly rated Farmington Falcons concluded their football season as undefeated and untied champions by downing the Clarenceville Trojans, 23-0, last Friday night as expected.

It has been a long time since the Falcons have compiled such a grid record. The last time to do it was the 1951 Falcon eleven.

The victory did not come as easily as the score might indicate, however. An inspired Clarenceville team, although out-manned and out-classed, gave the Falcons plenty of charges throughout the entire first half. Defensively, the Falcons seemed unable to cope with Trojan back Jon Nelson as he broke through the line repeatedly.

only for long gains. In 13 carries he reeled off a total of 165 yards for an average of almost 13 yards per carry.

It was a somewhat bewildering Falcon team that left the field at half-time leading by only a 14-0 margin. The loss of three regular linemen—tackles Bill Butler and Tom Guy and end Frank Clappison had a real noticeable effect.

The Falcons came back strong in the second half, however, and, capitalizing on Trojan miscues offensively, racked up three more touchdowns while holding Clarenceville scoreless.

Farmington struck fast after receiving Clarenceville's opening kickoff of the game. Neil Stevenson returned the kick to the Falcons' 40 yard line. After Mike Agee had moved the ball to the 50 yard line, the right side of the Farmington line opened up a hole in the Trojan defense and Tom Grimshaw scampered 50 yards for the touchdown. Harvey Chapman kicked the extra point, giving Farmington a 7-0 lead.

The Trojans returned Stevenson's kickoff to their own 27 yard line. Primarily through the efforts of Jon Nelson, Clarenceville's fine running back, the Trojans muffed 49 yards toward the Farmington goal line only to have Stevenson recover a fumble on the Falcons' 15 yard stripe.

After Agee had moved the ball to the 30 yard line, Allan LeSage unleashed a stunning 67 yard pass play to John Gringer. Stevenson then ran around right and, for the first three yards and Farmington's second score of the game. Chapman again kicked the extra point and Farmington led 14-0.

After returning Stevenson's kickoff to their own 36 yard line, the Trojans, led by Nelson, again marched down the field. This time, despite a 15 yard penalty, they moved in for the score, with Nelson covering the final eight yards. Clarenceville's try for the extra point was a good and Farmington led 14-6.

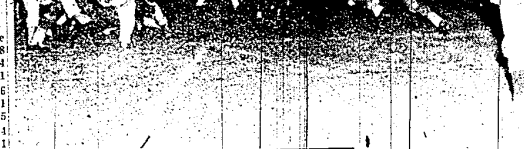
After receiving Clarenceville's kickoff the Falcons could not muster any offensive strength and were forced to kick Agee's punt carried to the Clarenceville 13 yard line. Again the Trojans started to drive down the field. Sparked by a 25 yard run by Nelson, they drove to Farmington's 22 yard line. A pushing penalty was called against Clarenceville, and on the following play Farmington was on the receiving end of another good break as John Dempsey recovered a second heart-breaking Trojan fumble.

With little time remaining in the half the Falcons again were unable to move the ball and were forced to punt. The half ended with Farmington 14-6.

To open the second half Clarenceville returned Stevenson's kick to the Trojans' own 45 yard line. The Trojans, again led by Nelson, drove to Farmington's 17. Here the Falcon defense pitched, however, to take possession of the ball on downs.

The Clarenceville Trojans' cross country team wound up its 1958 season with 6 wins and two losses in duo-meet competition.

This year, the team was led by Jerry Dowdy, sophomore, who came in first for Clarenceville six times, and Bob Leeds, senior, who came in first for the team four times.

In the regionals, Leeds placed tenth which qualified him for the state meet, where he placed 15th out of 141 contestants.

The team chalked up victories against: Bentley, 19-37; Milford 26-29; Detroit Lutheran W. 22-28; Garden City 26-29; West Bloomfield 26-30; and Oak Park 19-29. Losses to Redford Union, 47-16, and to Thurston, 37-20, completed the 6-2 record.

In the Thurston Invitational meet, Clarenceville placed third, behind Thurston and Redford Union, respectively.
