"Studying Michigan Schools" Project Gaining Momentum

A LEADING ROLE in the forthcoming production "Affairs of State," to be presented by the Township Players of West Bloomfield on Nov. 28 and 29 at West Bloomfield High is being taken by Lee O'Connor of 31710 Lamar Drive, Farmington. Leaders of the Farmington Area Parent Teacher Association Council report that the "Studying Michigan Schools" project of the Michigan Congress on Curriculum, Teaching, Financing and also higher education.
This educational project is designed to inform local residents about public education in their own community and in the state. Printed materials from the Michigan PTA include both a factual booklet, with space for local information, plus an opinionaire.
The local council reports that most local PTA units in the community are participating in this state-wide "Studying Michigan Schools" project. The council is serving in a coordinating, consultant kind of relationship.
In using this material, local units present at the program meetings. After a brief explanation of the project, the opinionaires are distributed to the participants.
The opinionaires allow adults the opportunity to voice their views as "agreeing" or "disagreeing" with 100 statements about education. The opinionaires and the factual booklets cover four areas—school program or curriculum, teaching, financing and also higher education.
The opinionaires then are collected.
The meeting continues, following the general possible patterns. The audience may be divided into "buzz groups" to discuss the many statements in the opinionaire. The factual material can be covered by one speaker or by four people each covering one of the areas. Or several educators and lay citizens may serve as a panel of experts to answer questions.
Local meetings, and those across the state, are different. Council leaders point out, the program is tailored to the local situation.
As the meeting closes, the PTA members and friends are given a copy of the factual booklet and their future studies. The booklet also contains a copy of the opinionaire, so they can discuss the statements further with the family, the neighbors and others.
A tabulating committee then goes to work and scores the opinionaires and reports the results to the Council. The Council in turn relays the results to the Michigan PTA office in Lansing.
This project is the major activity this year of the Michigan PTA and was developed during the summer with the cooperation of the Michigan Department of Public Instruction and the many state-supported colleges and universities.
PTA units are urged to conduct this program this fall or winter because it fits into a larger picture. Council officers point out. Results of the project and future programming should be considered at the regional conferences on Studying Michigan Schools which will be held across the state in January. The Michigan Winter Conference on Education will be February 26, the Michigan PTA Problem Clinic will consider the project at Michigan State University March 25 and the Michigan PTA State Convention in Bay City next spring will carry forth the work.
