The national debt is \$284 billions of dollars, and the share of Farmington city and township in this debt amounts to \$41,170,680. This may be compared with the state equalized valuation of the township and city, which comes to \$74,170,680.

In less astronomical terms, it comes to \$5,240 per family. A family's effective buying income in the combined city and township amounts to \$7,409.

This year's deficit in the federal budans year's deficit in the reder a budy got will add another \$75 to each family's share of the debt. The annual interest charge, which each family must pay in taxes, is \$144 per family.

How far will this deficit spending go? How great will the inflation be that is caused by this deficit spending? These must be among the things in the mind of Newsday. A Royal Oak firm has found a way to make very accurate dies under a metha lot faster than the old grinding method, so perhaps there is progress being made liere.

But this is only one instance. Here is another. A reel of barbed wire, made in Germany and shipped from Dusseldorf to New York, freighted by rail to Cleveland, hauled from the freight yards to the warehouse by truck, still costs the jobber \$40 a ton less than an identical reel of wire sold by U. S. Steel in Cleveland.

Can we continue each year to jack up wages and prices, and still be able to com-pete with foreign producers?

Why should an European buy American products, automobiles included, when he can buy the same or similar items for less at home?

You know the answer to that. The auto business is picking up fast, and employment figures which will soon be quoted will have a fine sound. Business may appear pretty good, to most people. But it's very likely total employment will be far under that of, say, a year ago.

Our unreal economic life is costing American jobs.
