Left to survive besides his wife Emma is a son, a daughter and a granddaughter.

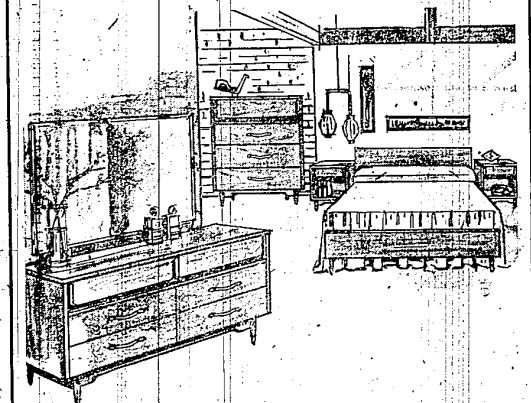
Clothes Drying
