John McCaffrey, former Farmington High School cager and a veteran of Army basketball, has made the Mount Union College varsity squad even though just a freshman.

At 6-5, McCaffrey is the tallest member of the "rookie" crop—but has to contend with letterman Bill Roof (6-7) and Dave Senfner (6-5) along with numerical winner Ed Agnioni (6-6) for team distinction.

The son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles McCaffrey of 21790 Farmington Road, he won three cage letters at Farmington and was picked on the All-Conference and All-State teams as a senior. More recently, he played at two years with the Walter Reed Army Medical Center in Washington, D. C.

While at Walter Reed, McCaffrey became acquainted with John Morey, a Mount Union graduate, who steered him to the Raider camp—much to the pleasure of Coach Wayne Ashbaugh.

Last year Mount posted a 13-0 overall record and had a 9-4 mark in the 14-school Ohio Conference to finish fourth.

Michigan Now Ski Capital Of Midwest

Michigan's winter resort areas are gearing for their biggest winter sports season in the state's travel history. In six short years Michigan has become the ski capital of the midwest.

According to the Michigan Tourist Council, the 69 organized winter sports centers in Michigan top every state except the Rockies.

Six new centers will open for the first time this winter, while other resorts will offer skiing enthusiasts expanded and improved facilities, said Robert J. Furlong, Council executive secretary.

"We expect at least 150,000 skiers to visit the 1958-59 season," Furlong said. "They will average three ski trips each and spend some \$14 million dollars in the process."

With today's trend toward family recreation, all of Michigan's resorts are equipped to handle beginners as well as experts and in-betweeners. Ski slopes vary in length from 300 feet to 3,000 feet, the longest at Cliffs Ridge Ski Resort in the western upper peninsula.

Ski center offerings include cross-country trails, slalom bowls and slinkings. Toboggan runs and sking rinks are featured in many areas. And for indoor enjoyment, there are restaurants, snack bars, lounges and warming shelters. Skiing equipment can be rented at most centers and several resorts offer "ski week and weekend" packages which include lodging, meals, equipment and instruction.

The new edition of the Tourist Council's statewide ski map and winter sports guide which pinpoints each of Michigan's 69 ski areas and lists their facilities is now available for free of charge.
