Rotunda Christmas Fantasy Entirely Different This Year

The sixth annual Ford Rotunda Christmas Fantasy, with new displays and an entirely different "cast of characters" from the wonderful world of fable and folklore, has now opened at the Rotunda in Dearborn, Mich.

Outstanding new attraction this year, for children and adults alike, is a 15,000-piece miniature animated circus, complete with animals, wagons, circus train and performers.

Central religious theme of the fantasy — one of the nation's best known holiday presentations — is the life-size Nativity scene in the Rotunda center court. Represented in the tableau will be figures of Mary and Joseph, the Christ child, Wise Men and their camels, shepherds and their sheep.

The background motif for the

Nativity scene is a full-size reproduction of a church organ, with organ music to add a touch of realism. Detroit area choral groups will provide concerts periodically in the center court.

As always, the outer court is filled with animated characters from the world of fantasy.

One section are scores of animated dolls representing children of all nations. In another is the "shopping center" with a doll beauty shop; in another, a large candy shop where animated workmen endlessly manufacture chocolate-covered delicacies.

There also is a rustic hand-drawn and hand-painted woodenland characters frolicking in the snow.

The largest single display is the miniature circus, in which workers unload the train, set up the big top and sell tickets; the animals perform the sideshow dancers; dance and the "barker" circuses. There are performing elephants, bareback riders, animal trainers — every traditional facet of the real, old-fashioned circus.

Santa Claus is in his castle at the top of the outer court ramp, to hear the whispered wishes of thousands of youngsters. A 40-foot high Christmas tree, with 18,000 individual lights, dominates the east Rotunda entrance.

Cartoon movies for children — and adults — run continuously in the Florida theater.

The Rotunda is open from 8 p.m. to 9 p.m., Monday through Saturday, and from 1 p.m. to 9 p.m. on Sunday. The Fantasy closes at 5 p.m. in Christmas Eve.

The Rotunda Christmas show was seen by 735,296 visitors between November 30 and December 21.

Will Distribute New Jehovah's Resolutions

Jehovah's Witnesses are returning to their congregation at an assembly at Mumford High School.

Over 1800 in attendance heard "The Watch Tower Society in God's Purpose," Mr. Peter B. Wura, the district supervisor had informed the audience in the evening session that all of Jehovah's Witnesses will be engaging in door-to-door ministry for the entire month of December and leaving with them a message that had been adopted by 194,418 Christians at Yankee Stadium and the Polo Grounds in New York City last August 1, 1958.

Flem R. Caudell, presiding minister of Farmington congregation, is preparing to instruct the 127 ministers how to present the adopted resolution to all the neighbors in the vicinity of the Farmington Kingdom Hall. The Farmington congregation is included with over 3,700 United States congregations who will be distributing over 26,500,000 copies.

In world-wide distribution over 17,000 congregations will be distributing it in 50 languages.

The church will organize with 80 charter members and the organization will take place at Eagle elementary school at the corner of Middlebelt and 14 Mile Roads on December 7th at 7:30 p.m. in the multi-purpose room. Dr. Harry Rhine De Young of Redford Avenue Presbyterian Church will deliver the sermon. The Rev. Edward D. Auchard of Orchard Lake Community Church will act as moderator of the organizational service. Dr. Harold Fredsell, Director of Church Extension of the Presbytery of Detroit and Herbert Hunter of Birmingham, an Elder at the First Presbyterian Church, Birmingham will also take part in the service.

This is a high point in the life of this congregation. It began meeting in the school on January 1957. The plans are to begin building one year from now on the 13 acre site.

The organizing pastor, is Ralph Strick who has been with the congregation since August 1957.
