To Lay St. Mary Hospital Cornerstone on Dec. 15

The blessing and laying of the cornerstone for the new St. Mary Hospital at Levan and Five Mile Roads will be placed on Monday, December 15, at 2:30 p.m.

The Rt. Rev. Jerome Smalarz, presiding judge at the Archdiocesan Tribunal, will officiate. The speakers for the occasion will be the Honorable James M. Hare, Secretary of State, and George Walker, Vice-President of the Ford/Motor Company.

Officials representing the five communities to be served by St. Mary Hospital are expected to be in attendance.

Within the cornerstone will be placed a steel box in which will be preserved documents for posterity. Among other things, the contents of the box will include the names of ecclesiastical and civil rulers of our time, the Religious Superiors of the Felician Sisters Order (the St. Mary Hospital staff, the St. Mary Hospital Administrative Advisory Board members, the St. Mary Hospital Guild Board of Directors, official documents in connection with the building of the hospital, the names of the engineers and superintendents, names of Life Members and Patrons of the St. Mary Hospital Guild, and religious articles and souvenirs.

It has been approximately six months since work began on the hospital. Due to the fine organization of the architects, contractors, builders and suppliers, and the excellent weather, the hospital has made unusual progress. This week finds the roof

of the machinery room pent up at the core of the building and the penthouse for the elevators completed. Exterior masonry has been completed on the five percent mark.

The Felician Sisters wish to share their joy in the crossing of another milestone in the construction of the hospital with all their friends and benefactors. The public is cordially invited to attend the Cornerstone Ceremony.

Chairman of the program will be W. W. Edgar, chairman of the St. Mary Hospital Administration Advisory Board.

The invocation will be given by Reverend Thomas P. Beaton, pastor of Our Lady of Sorrows Parish in Farmington. This will be followed by an introduction of the guest speakers, the Honorable James M. Hare, and George Walker by Edgar.
