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### C'ville School Fire Inspection

Insurance workers recently completed a survey of all schools in the Clarencville district, and found no special fire hazards, only minor changes were recommended. The survey had been started even before the recent disastrous Chicago fire.

### 11 1/2 Mile X-way Route "Shift"

Many township residents affected by the recent changes in the proposed route of the 11 1/2 mile Expressway, as originally outlined by State High Dept. engineers, met Monday night.

These residents have formed a group known as the 11 1/2 mile Expressway Assn.

At the meeting Harold Rowe, executive director of the Association, related information which he had obtained in interviews with state and federal officials in Lansing. A committee report was also given quoting state officials concerning pressure and petitions received from many people not directly affected by the expressway.

In a lively discussion which followed, it was stated that the map used by the Farmington Twp. Planning Board deviated from the State Highway Dept. map in many respects. It was also stated that the proposed route, as set now, is different than that recommended by the planning board.

It was charged that the planning board saw the proposed changed route for the first time at the public hearing held here recently.

Information now being gathered by the association is being relayed to Lansing. It has been indicated by state highway officials that a thorough study of the matter is being made, Rowe said.

### Wood Creek Has 23 Pools, Ponds

Of the approximately 135 families living in Wood Creek Farm Village, 11 have private swimming pools and 12 others have private ponds, Viologle Clerk Arthur J. Busch disclosed last week.

Requested some time ago to adopt a swimming pool ordinance in Farmington township, the village council has yet to take action pending an exhaustive study of the matter.

In earlier discussion, objection was voiced by some councilmen to the requirement that the pools be enclosed by a chain-link fence. It was also questioned whether a swimming pool ordinance alone would be adequate if it did not include some protective provisions for the private ponds. Some felt that unenclosed ponds were as dangerous as pools.
