The election was followed by a banquet attended by more than 200 persons. Following the dinner, a program open to the public, featured Dr. Joe Vincent Meigs, Consulting Chief of the Veterans' Memorial Hospital in Boston, who spoke on "The Advances of Knowledge in Cancer and Its Therapy."


