

Falcons Beat Van Dyke, N'ville; Southfield to be A Tougher Foe

Farmington Falcon cagers will have their work cut out for them this Friday evening when they take on a powerful Southfield High club on their home court.

In a second place tie with Walled Lake in the Inter-Lakes League, the Southfield side has been pegged as the only team that has any hope of halting undefeated Berkley in its quest for the title. The Berkley team has chalked up 18 league wins without defeat.

ONE THING is certain; the Falcons will have no easy time of it such as they did last Friday against outclassed Van Dyke.

The win over Van Dyke, Farmington's first in three league weekend by downing Northville, contests, moved them into a tie for third in the league.

Jumping off fast in the opening moments of the game against Van Dyke, the Falcons

had built up a 13-0 margin before their foe could tally.

By half-time the Falcons were still in possession of a commanding lead, 20-14.

THE SECOND HALF took much the same pattern as the first. By the end of the third quarter the Falcons had increased their lead to 42-24.

In the final period Coach Bob Dorch substituted freely but the Vikings were still not able to narrow the margin. The game ending with Farmington way out in front 54-33.

The return of Al LeSage, out with injuries suffered in the final football game of the season, to the starting lineup proved a big help. He showed well both offensively and defensively.

TOM GRIMSIAW, showing his usual spark and speed despite his size disadvantage, was high point man for Farmington with 14 points. Ken Cobb with 10. High scorer for Van Dyke was George Hatch with 12 points.

A feature of tonight's wrestling match between Farmington and Southfield is that local fans battling the heavyweight bout between George Fawcett and the Jay's Dan Marsh. Both lads top the scales at around 265 pounds. It should be quite a display of heavyweight wrestling talent and we strongly urge all area sports fans to drop over to the high school tonight to see this and 11 other exciting bouts. Doing it.

Trojans Chalk Up Forth Straight; 2nd in League

The Clareneville Trojans chalked up their third and fourth consecutive victories in six contests last week.

On Tuesday they took on the Schaefers Vikings in a non-league contest and beat them by a 45-9 margin.

The Vikings took an early lead in the opening minutes of the contest but then swept back in the second half to leave the floor at half-time leading 21-16.

F.H.S. Wrestlers Outclass Van Dyke on Home Mats

Falcon wrestlers won 12 matches, six of them by pins, to defeat a game but outclassed Van Dyke wrestling squad 39-15 last Thursday on the Falcons' home mats.

The score may have been more uneven if Farmington hadn't been forced to forfeit five points to Van Dyke because of their lack of a 95 pound wrestler.

John McCamy, one of Coach Gene Fred's two excellent heavyweights, topped the evening with an early bout pin of John Austin in the over 175 pound class. It was quite obvious that John was out-weighted in the match but the Falcon heavyweight proved that heavy-pounding isn't the only deciding factor by pinning his opponent early in the bout.

ONE OF THE most spirited bouts of the evening was the 145 pound match between the Falcons' Larry Gerber and Bill Anke of the Abies. The bout took on the aspects of a boxing match at times but both lads settled down in the last two periods to some good clean wrestling. Gerber overcame a 5-4 deficit late in the match with a near-pin to win 7-5.

Dick Land, wrestling in the 136 pound class, continued his fine work for the Falcons by pinning Larry Anglin to win the 145 pound match between the Falcons into an 18-15 lead after the seventh bout. The Falcons went on to capture the next five matches to end the Van Dyke threat.

TOM PECKHAM remained undefeated by registering the fastest fall of the evening. He pinned his opponent at 1:20 of the first period.

Dave Timm, Dick Brogren and Dan Resler also registered pins in the meet.

Tonight, Thursday, Farmington will host the Southfield wrestlers.
