Elected were: Barbara Danz, president; Debbie Vukmir, vice president; Carol Nickel, secretary; Christine Nickel, treasurer.

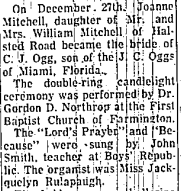
Linda McPhail is in charge of saying blessing before treats. Linda is in charge of the club sippin'.

Now's the time to start attic, cupboard, closet and basement cleaning.

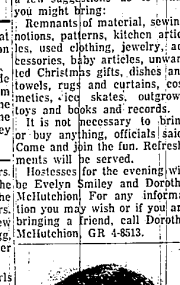
