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## Exchange Pupil Applications Being Taken

Applications are again being accepted for the AFS Summer program. The screening committee of one parent, staff members, two Student Council members and our AFS students, have interviewed all applicants and considered their preliminary applications yesterday, January 14, during home room.

A candidate for the AFS program must be at least 16 years of age by June 30, 1959, have studied a foreign language, be a member of the Junior class, be a U.S. citizen, have an excellent academic record and be in excellent health.

The cost for the program is \$325. This sum includes the cost of round-trip ocean transportation; round trip travel abroad between ports and final destination; (meals included); health insurance; the final week-end abroad; chaperone; orientation; other administrative expenses; spending money for shipping of including tips; and spending money to see the student safely home from the U.S. or Canadian port of embarkation.

Personal expenses in addition to the U.S. or Canadian port and home and personal spending money for the period abroad, must not exceed \$5 per week. This regulation is very important. Any student who wants to make a sightseeing or business trip out of the AFS program must not consider participating, as they would only waste the program. There is no exit for any student to have for is for "emergency" purposes. At all times while the student is under the jurisdiction of the ship, he must be under the ship until he returns on his stay abroad; there is always emergency funds available to each student.

## Tentative Plans Being Made For Several New Courses

Tentative plans have been made for offering new and, in some cases, advanced courses in the speech, mathematics, home economics, vocal music, and language departments in the near future.

These classes will depend on student enrollment and interest, shown toward these new and different classes.

The speech department will offer a one semester class next year open to any junior or senior. The class will cover the basic fundamentals such as discussion, debate, impromptu and extemporaneous speeches. This speech course will be offered both semesters and no pre-requisites will be necessary.

A long range plan is to be undertaken by the mathematics department; the proposed project will cover a five year period. The revamping, which will start next year, will mean that a potential math major could start high school mathematics in the eighth grade.

A test taken in the seventh grade to determine mathematical ability, if satisfactorily completed, would allow the student to take Algebra I in the eighth grade. Grades 10, and 11 would consist of Plane Geometry, Algebra II, Solid Geometry, and Trigonometry, respectively. Math in the senior year would be a new course in college mathematics fundamentals, including some calculus, advanced algebra, and analytic geometry.

An alteration will be made in the home economics department next year also. All girls who take home ec will have to take the classes in sequence, which would mean taking Home Ec I before Home Ec II, home Ec II

before Home Ec III, etc. There will be no Home and Family Living course next year. The speech, mathematics, home economics I for Senior Girls, as well as the speech, mathematics, and language departments in the near future.

Other changes next year will be in the vocal music department. Besides having a Girls' Glee Club and a Mixed Choir, an A Cappella Choir comprised of from 20-25 girls will be started. If there is enough male interest, a combined a cappella group may be formed.

The language department may be expanded next year to accommodate an advanced Spanish course, Spanish III. It will be a class that will dwell further into the Spanish language by reading, listening to records and more practice with speaking and grammar. If this class is successful, a French III class may be added the next year and Latin II the following year.

These boys have been selected from 50 boys who tried out. Since they do not have a regular music class they will practice for the Cantata on their own free time.

Rehearsals for the Cantata will begin on Saturday, January 18, and will continue every Sunday thereafter until the Cantata.
