A gathering of approximately 300 enjoyed a potluck supper at the O. E. Dunckel Junior High last Wednesday.

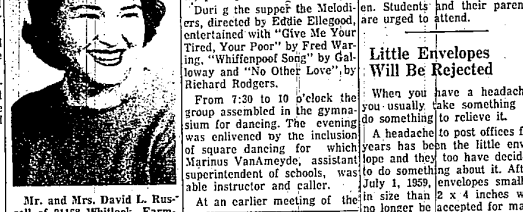
