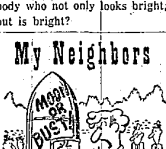
New Tower

The National Park Service has approved of a new and unique "sky-port" observation tower atop 6,643-foot high Clingmans Dome in the Great Smoky Mountains National Park in Tennessee and North Carolina.

The new tower, replacing a dismantled structure, will be located 6,658 feet above sea level, the highest viewpoint on the 2,000-mile Appalachian Trail. The Great Smoky Mountains National Park has a higher annual visitation record than any other national park.

Sec. of Army to Speak At Lincoln Banquet

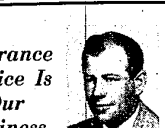
Congressman William S. Broomfield, an honoree at the banquet, will be Secretary of the Army. Wilbur M. Brucker, former Governor of Michigan.
