## Formosa Missionaries to Speak At First Baptist This Sunday

How to present Christianity to the 500,000 Chinese people of Taiwan, Formosa, was the problem which faced the Rev. Daniel Carr when he began his missionary work there five years ago.

Carr, who will speak at Farmington First Baptist Church on Sunday, February 15 at 9:00 and 11:30 a.m., services went to Formosa after being trained by the Chinese government and the United States government. When he arrived in Taiwan, there were no other missionaries in that country, and few Christians and few churches.

The first method Carr used consisted of house-to-house visitation, open-air meetings and English-Bible classes. Many Formosans are anxious to learn the English language, making such classes an excellent means of contacting them. Those who showed special interest in Christianity were invited to the Carr home where they received more information.

First woman, then a man, became Christians. The man went out and brought his wife, the best friend brought his sister. The woman invited her brother to attend with her. Thus the tiny group of Christians grew until they could no longer fit into the living room of the Carr home where they had been meeting.

What should they do? First the Christians decided to begin taking offerings at their services. The money would pay the rent for a meeting hall. Next, they must find food and clothing for the people. This seemed impossible.

One of the Christian leaders, however, was so convinced that there was a place for them that he asked the community leaders in his section of town for their assistance. The officials said, "If the Baptist church will put a little money each month into repairs on the place, we move they be given the use of our community hall free."

The Baptist church of Taiwan continued to grow until they were able to purchase land and build their own church, which was dedicated in 1953. They have an active Sunday School, women's and young people's groups. The leaders are Formosans who have been trained by Mr. and Mrs. Carr. The church has been active in taking Christianity to nearby towns and already there is a church in Taiwan.

These two churches, as well as those being established by the Foreign Mission Society workers in Taiwan, need trained pastors and leaders. To provide this need a Bible school has been established in Taiwan and both Carr and Carr taught classes there before leaving.

Before beginning missionary work, Mr. Carr was graduated from Baylor University, Waco, Texas, and Eastern Baptist Seminary, Philadelphia. He served as a U.S. Naval chaplain for three years. Following an extended furlough in the United States, the Carrs came to Farmington to continue missionary work.

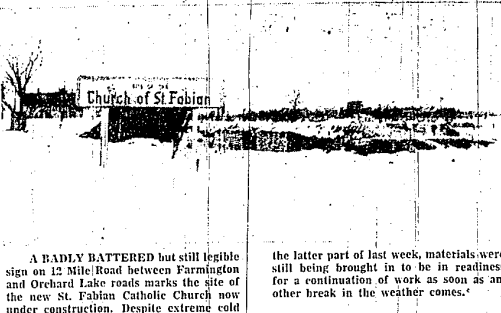
