Q. "Will you please discuss varicose veins and ulcers?"  
A. Leg veins bear a heavy burden because they must support a weighty column of blood extending from the feet upward. Larger leg veins have tiny shelf-like valves to help support the weight of the blood. If there is a tendency for the valves or supporting tissues around the veins to weaken, the internal pressure balloons the normally smooth, straight veins into knotty, crooked tubes (varicose veins) through which blood flows sluggishly. The stagnation allows waste products to collect and this further damages leg tissue. The skin over the affected vein begins to itch, becomes discolored, and often breaks down, producing an ulcer. Some cases are helped by use of elastic stockings—others require injection treatment or surgery. Even when treatment is successful, the condition may return in time as other veins become involved. For this reason, people who have had vein trouble should visit the doctor every so often for a check up.

Q. "If blond or brunette parents have a redheaded baby, how could the child's hair color be different?"  
A. No. Hair color is inherited. The trait is not only passed along by parents but by ancestors even further removed. This explains why a redheaded baby will occasionally pop up in a "no redheads" family group.

Q. Does the freezing of water kill all germs?  
A. No. Water-borne diseases may easily be spread by contaminated ice. Ice used in drinks should be as clean as drinking water.
