

Falcon JVs Suffer First League Loss

Although losing their first league game in nine starts to Southfield Friday night, 69-51, the Falcon JV team fighting back Saturday to defeat the Redford Union JV by a score of 63-45.

Friday night found the Farmington JV's in trouble from the opening jump. The Jays quickly took a commanding lead which they never relinquished. The Redford Union managed to outscore the Jays in the second period, 23-19, the score was still much in favor of Southfield at the half, 36-25.

The second half saw the Falcons edging slowly to the Southfield score, but the buzzer sounded before they made the mark. High point men for Farmington were Allen and Saly with 13 and 12 points, respectively. Southfield's Schaff took point honors for the game with 17 tallies.

Average of their previous defeat was an enjoyable task on Saturday. The Redford Union JV's were outplayed and outscored in every quarter to make the game a one-sided affair. An early lead in the game swelled to a score of 18-4 for the first quarter. The Falcons almost doubled their score in the second period with the half-time count reading 32-22.

In the third and fourth quarters, the Falcons were also scoring freely, even though Coach Graham was filling through the ranks on the bench, substituting quite often. Dave Crouse, Falcon center, was high point man with 13 marks.

Trojans Give League Leading Brighton Real Score Friday

Thanks to a fast whistle and last second field goal, league leading Brighton barely edged out the "never-say-die" Clarenceville Trojans 55-53.

The game, played before a capacity crowd at the CHS gym, reversed the margin and were ahead, 29-27.

The Bulldogs opened up in the third quarter, and pulled in front by as many as 13 points at one time. At the third quarter end Brighton was leading 37-27.

In the final five minutes, Clarenceville caught fire behind the shooting of Warren, Giacobazzi and Simons. With these three leading the pack, CHS outscored their taller opponents 16-10 in the final stanza.

WITH 20 SECONDS to play, CHS had pulled into a 53-53 tie, and the Bulldogs were taking the ball down-court toward their offensive basket. CHS junior, Ron Warren, made interception of the ball and took it cleanly after a moment's struggle with the Brighton ball-carrier. This was the first whistle played prominently, because a "jump ball" was called. Brighton's height made that an easy matter.

Following the jump, Brighton's Appleton tossed in a field goal and the scoring stopped there.

The loss dropped CHS into tie in league standings, but league-leading Brighton had their hands full, and the Trojans can take pride in the battle they put up.

Farmington is leading league rivals in the competition for the Inter-Lakes Conference Sportsmanship Trophy.

Figures for the first seven league games reveal that the Falcons are in first place with a total of 135 points. Following Farmington are: Southfield with 151; Berkley, 161; Waterford, 172; Van Dyke, 176; and Walled Lake, 215.

Each school selects a committee of two, made up of a faculty member and a student member, to attend the game and grade the opposition.

The student body, cheerleaders, the team, and the coaches are rated.

Attitude, attendance, and spirit determine the student body's rating. Cheerleaders are judged on courtesy and spirit. Each team is rated according to team spirit and attitude. The coach's attitude is also rated.

Good spirit and attendance will help qualify Farmington's chances of winning the Sportsmanship Trophy at tomorrow's game with Berkley.

AT THE HALF the Jays were out front 32-23.

In the third period the Falcons still found it hard to find the mark and were held to eight points while the Jays were racking in 15 to stretch their lead to 47-31.

Coach Robert Burtch substituted freely in the last quarter, who did not receive gold keys.

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Falcon Matmen Fall at Hands Of Thurston

Farmington's matmen lost to Thurston last Tuesday night by a score of 10-24. The Falcons are sporting a winning record, however, they have won six of their 11 meets.

Before the Falcons were able to register their first point producing performance, Thurston had already chalked up 13 points.

Gary Kinsel showed promise but was defeated in the 98 pound class. Due to Don Hendry's failure to make his wrestling weight of 106 pounds the Falcons dropped five points further behind Thurston. Dave Timm was pinned in the 115 pound match making the score 13-0 in favor of Thurston.

Tom Peckham brought the Falcons their first two points as he wrestled his opponent to a 4-4 tie. The tie brought a temporary end to the stirring of victory in dual competition. He is still undefeated, however.

Pins by Jerry (Cassell) and Jack Callahan brought Farmington up fast and to within three points of their opponents. Cassell pinned his man in three minutes and 37 seconds of the second period and Callahan registered his pin in the third period.

Dick Linn wrestled his opponent to a 5-5 tie in the second match of the evening.

Farmington did not have a 147 pound wrestler to compete and the forfeit dropped the Falcons ten points behind Thurston.

Frank DePodesta lost his match in the 157 pound class, making the score 23-12.

John McHenry was pinned in the third period of his match, eliminating all hope of a Falcon victory.

Thurston did not have a wrestler to challenge "Big" George Fawcett in the unlimited class, making the final score 30-24.

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
