After 85 Years, Communicable Diseases Still Threat in State

The State Board of Health was created by the state legislature in 1873 and was succeeded in 1919 by the state health commission and the Michigan Department of Health.

"In 1958," Dr. Albert E. Heustis said, "communicable diseases were still a threat, just as they were in 1873. Vaccines have brought most of the 1873 killers under control, but any communicable disease is capable of staging a strong comeback anytime we drop our immunity guard."

He cited paratyphoid as an example. Crippling polio struck 530 Michigan persons in 1958 after causing only 121 cases in 1957.

"Polio bounced back in 1958 even though we have an excellent vaccine to use against it," Dr. Heustis said. "But the vaccine can't protect us when it's on warehouse shelves."

Other communicable diseases remained at previous years' levels or even declined. Dr. Heustis added. Diphtheria, a leading cause of death in 1873, dropped from a record high of 130 cases in 1873 to less than a dozen in 1958. Typhoid fever, another leading 1873 killer, was blamed for only 12 new cases this year, same as in 1957.

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Advice on Child Treatment, Care Given Parents of Nursery Tots

The Physical Needs of the "Pre-School Child" was the subject of a forum and question and answer period conducted at a meeting of the Mayfair Cooperative Nursery recently.

Allen Sosin, M.D., Farmington Pediatrician, M. J. Traffell, D.D.S., local dentist, and Mrs. Harold Sharp, speech pathologist and correctional practitioner, gave presentations in their respective fields and answered questions of the members of the Nursery.

Mrs. Bernard Cantor, program chairman, introduced the speakers and led the discussion period.

"When to call the doctor" was a topic of great interest to the 38 mothers and fathers in attendance.

"The way the child acts often tells more than the height of the fever," Dr. Sosin stated. He pointed out that a child may be quite ill without running a high temperature, since fever is merely an indication that the body is fighting the infection.

In general, Dr. Sosin advised, "if you are worried about the child, if he is lethargic and irritable, call the doctor."

He also emphasized the fact that a doctor will not request that the child be brought into his office for examination if there is any danger to the child from inclement weather or any other cause. Better treatment can be given in the doctor's office, he said, where equipment and trained assistance are available.

The importance of regular check-ups and booster shots was discussed as a part of normal protection for the child's health. Dr. Sosin gave some general advice on treatment of a sick child in the home, but warned against the use of antibiotics unless prescribed by a physician.

"Help your child to think of the dentist as a friend," was the advice of Dr. Traffell.

Casual preparation for the first visit to the dentist, usually advisable around the age of 3 to 4 years.

SCHOOL DISTRICT BONDS

Sealed bids for the purchase of School District Bonds to be issued by Farmington Public School District, Oakland County, Michigan, of the par value of \$1,500,000, will be received by the undersigned, at the office of the Board of Education, 3000 Third Street, Farmington, Michigan, until 8:00 o'clock P.M., Eastern Standard Time, on Monday, the 9th day of March, 1959, at which time and place said bids will be publicly opened and read.

The said bonds will be issued in two series, as follows: (1) School District Bonds, Series 1, in the aggregate principal sum of \$1,500,000, maturing on June 1 in each year as follows:

\$30,000 in each of the years 1960 thru 1962
35,000 in each of the years 1963 thru 1965
40,000 in each of the years 1966 thru 1968
45,000 in each of the years 1969 thru 1972
50,000 in each of the years 1973 and 1974
60,000 in each of the years 1975 and 1977
65,000 in the year 1978
70,000 in each of the years 1979 and 1980
75,000 in the year 1981
80,000 in the year 1982
85,000 in the year 1983
90,000 in the year 1984

(2) School District Bonds, Series 2, in the aggregate principal sum of \$250,000, maturing on June 1 in each year as follows:

\$5,000 in each of the years 1960 thru 1969, and
10,000 in each of the years 1970 thru 1984.
Said bonds of each series will be sold in coupon form, the rate or rates not exceeding 5% per annum, payable on June 1, 1959, and thereafter semi-annually on December 1 and June 1. Each bid shall state the interest rate or rates desired, expressed in multiples of 1/8%.

The interest rate for each coupon period on any one bond shall be at one rate only. Accrued interest to date of delivery of the bonds must be paid by the purchaser at the time of delivery.

Bonds of each series maturing in the years 1975 thru 1979, are subject to redemption by the school district prior to maturity at the option of the school district, and interest on such bonds shall be paid on the date of redemption plus a premium on each bond in accordance with the following:

\$15 if called to be redeemed on or after June 1, 1974 but prior to June 1, 1976;
\$15 if called to be redeemed on or after June 1, 1976 but prior to June 1, 1978;
\$10 if called to be redeemed on or after June 1, 1978 but prior to June 1, 1980.

Notice of redemption shall be published not less than 30 days prior to the date fixed for redemption, at least once in a newspaper of general circulation in the City of Detroit, Michigan, which carries as a part of its regular service, notices of the sale of municipal bonds. The remaining bonds will not be subject to redemption prior to maturity.

The bonds are to be issued for the purpose of erecting, building, and furnishing the cost of erect
