Cars, Grades Just Don't Mix

After a lot of parents complained because their children were getting failing marks, Principal Edwin Anderson of Prosser Washington High School made a survey. His figures of seniors with A or B grades, only 11 per cent own cars or have the use of them regularly. Among grade seniors, 33 per cent have a car, and 62 per cent of the C minus to failing seniors are motorized. Cars owned by juniors with A or B grades, none; with C grades, 31 per cent; and C minus to failing marks, 39 per cent.

The tabulations, Anderson added, did not include youths who had just quit school to buy gas, parts and polish for their jalopies.

For Biennial Spring Election

To the Qualified Electors of the Township of Farmington, COUNTY OF OAKLAND, STATE OF MICHIGAN

Notice is hereby given that in conformity with the Michigan Election Law, 11, the undersigned Clerk, will, upon any day, exercising his discretion, the day of any regular or special election or primary election, receive for registration the name of any legal voter in said Township, City or Village who has been duly qualified who may APPLY TO ME PERSONALLY for such registration. Provided, however, that I can receive no names City or Village after the time intervening between the Thirtieth day before any regular, special or official primary election and the day of such election.

As provided by Section 498, Act No. 116, Public Acts of 1951.

From 8 o'clock a.m. until 6 o'clock p.m. on each said day for the purpose of RECEIVING the REGISTRATION and REGISTERING such of the qualified electors in said TOWNSHIP as SHALL PROPERLY apply therefor.

The name of no person but an ACTUAL RESIDENT of the precinct at the time of registration, and entitled under the constitution to vote in the election, shall be registered. If remaining such resident, to vote at the next election, shall be entered in the registration books.

ELECTOR UNABLE TO MAKE PERSONAL APPLICATION, PROCEDURE

SEC. 501. Any elector who is unable to make personal application for registration because of physical disability or absence from the Township, City or Village in which his legal residence is located, may be registered prior to the close of registration before any election or primary election by securing from the Clerk of the Township, City or Village in which is located his legal residence, duplicate registration cards and applying to the Clerk of the Township, City or Village before a notary public or other officer legally authorized to administer oaths and returning such registration cards to the Clerk of the Township, City or Village before the close of office hours on the last day of registration prior to any election or primary election. The notary public or other officer authorized to administer oaths shall sign his name in the line for the signature of the registration officer and designate his title.

UNREGISTERED PERSONS NOT ENTITLED TO VOTE

SEC. 501. The inspectors of election at any election or primary election in this State, or in any District, County, Township, City or Village thereof, shall not receive the vote of any person whose name is not registered in the registration book of the Township, Ward or Precinct in which he offers to vote. (As provided under Act 116, P.A. 1954.)

TRANSFER OF REGISTRATION; APPLICATION, TIME

SEC. 506. Any registered elector may upon change of residence within the Township, City or Village cause his registration to be transferred to his new address by sending to the Clerk a signed request, stating his present address, the date he moved thereto, and the address from which he was last registered, or by applying to the Clerk of the Township, City or Village before the last address, ward and precinct number and record the new address, ward and precinct number on the original and duplicate registration cards, and shall place the original registration card in proper precinct file. Such transfers shall not be made within the (30) days next preceding any election or primary election. Transfers made only by mail shall fall on a Saturday, Sunday or legal holiday in which event registration shall be accepted during the next full working day provided that the elector has not permitted any person to vote in any Township, City or Village in which he had not resided (30) days next preceding any election or primary election.

TRANSFER OF REGISTRATION ON ELECTION DAY

SEC. 507. Any registered elector who has removed from one precinct of a Township, City or Village to another election precinct of the same Township, City or Village shall have the right to make application to have his registration transferred on the day of the election by executing a request over his or her signature for such transfer and presenting the same to the election board in the precinct to which he is transferring. Upon receipt of such request the inspector of election in charge of the registration records shall compare the signature thereon with the signature upon the applicant's registration record and if the signatures correspond then the inspector shall certify such fact upon said request and the applicant for transfer shall then be permitted to vote in such precinct for that election. If the application for transfer shall be filed with the Township, City or Village Clerk who shall transfer such voter's registration in accordance with the application. When the name of a street in a Township, City or Village has been changed, it shall be the duty of the Township, City or Village Clerk to make a change to show the proper name of street in the registration records, and it shall not be necessary for the elector to change his registration with respect thereto in order to be eligible to vote.
