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LEGAL NOTICE

AMENDMENT TO REGULATIONS PERTAINING TO FINAL DISPOSAL OF GARBAGE AND RUBBISH WITHIN THE TOWNSHIP OF FARMINGTON.

The Farmington Township Board of Health hereby adopts the following amendments to the Regulations Pertaining to the Final Disposal of Garbage and Rubbish within the Township of Farmington, adopted September 23, 1958.

The following paragraph is hereby added to Section 4 of such regulations:

A. 1. No permit shall be issued by the Township Board of Health except after public hearing. Notice of the time and place of such hearing shall be published in a newspaper of general circulation in such Township at least one week prior to such hearing. Notice of such hearing shall be given by the person or other duly authorized person to all owners of property within one thousand (1,000) feet of the proposed disposal area, as shown on the tax rolls, by registered mail, return receipt requested.

This amendment shall be effective immediately upon first publication in the Farmington Enterprise, Farmington, Michigan.

- Mumps
- Fish Eye Injections
- Shin Stripes

Q. "Should children, especially little boys, be deliberately exposed to a case of mumps so they won't have it later?"

A. Reader.

Q. "I am 13 and my busts have developed pinkish stripes. What is the cause and what can I do to clear this up?"

A. This sort of thing is not so rare in young girls who most or less suddenly begin to develop. As you call them, are due to stretching of the skin. In time, Youngsters whose busts are so large as to be uncomfortable would do well to contact the family physician.

Q. "I have heard that eye cutouts can be cured by injections made from fish eyes. What can you tell me about this?"

A. Various non-surgical treatments including use of fish lens extract, have been tried in catarrhs.
