

To Be Local Representative At MEA Meet

Ada Bronson of Farmington has been named special delegate to the annual Representative Assembly of the Michigan Education Association to be held in Lansing, April 3-4.

The Farmington delegate, a member of the Michigan Education Association (MEA), will be among more than 300 educators from all over Michigan attending the two-day session.

The annual gathering is responsible for charting the future of the MEA, making policy decisions and saving budget problems.

This year's Assembly faces some important decisions, Charlotte Richards, MEA president, reports. The group will have to solve internal financial problems which include a proposed dues increase, in addition to handling matters of state aid to education, federal support, professional standards and curriculum programs.

The conference will be highlighted by the presentation of the 1959 Distinguished Service Award. Dr. Albert J. Phillips, executive secretary of the MEA for 21 years until 1958, will receive the award.

Election of officers will require the Assembly's action. Charlotte Richards, 1958-59 president, will turn over the gavel to John Strandberg, president-elect from Detroit. Strandberg is head of the department of exact science at Mumford high school.

A banquet on April 3 will attract all delegates, 400 officers, members, representatives from the MEA, guests and members of press and radio. The Distinguished Service Award will be presented at this time.

Dr. Andrew David (Andy) Holt, vice president of the University of Tennessee, will be the keynote speaker at the opening banquet. Dr. Holt, who was president of the National Education Association from 1949-50, is known throughout the country for his outstanding contributions to education.

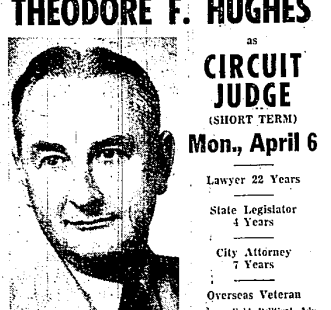

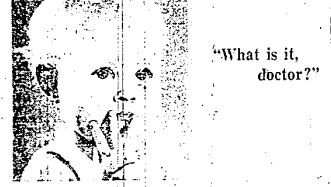

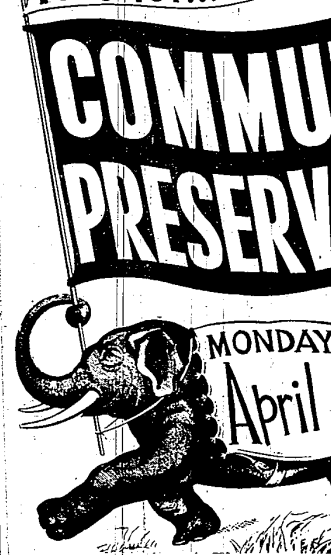
