

Township Annual Meeting
Saturday, Dunckel Jr. Hi

Next Saturday afternoon at 3 o'clock the Farmington township annual meeting will convene at O. E. Dunckel Junior High School, 3280 West 12 Mile Road. It precedes the April 6 general election by two days.

The agenda for the meeting, and the proposed annual budget were both approved earlier by the township board and published last week.

ASSISTING as needed at the annual meeting will be Dr. Louie Friedland, expert parliamentarian from Wayne State University.

General outline of the meeting agenda is all set, except that items which are regarded as coming properly before a meeting will be added if requested. Discussion will then be confined to authorized items, and not be allowed on things which have no place at an annual meeting.

AGAIN this year the main item of business will be the proposed budget. It is based upon a hoped for increase in millage by the county allocation board. Last year the township asked for an increase from the .86 of a mill it has received a couple of years. Partly because there were excess funds last year, even though marked for fire stations, the request was turned down.

This year there are no excess funds, and the budget includes expenditures for fire hall sites and one station, depending on what can be squeezed out.

FARC Winter
Program Called
'Huge Success'

The twelve-week Saturday morning winter recreation program conducted by the Farmington Area Recreation Council (FARC) was termed a "huge success" by Director Warren Piche.

The program, which offered a variety of recreational activities for boys and girls between the ages of 8 and 15, made possible through the cooperation of the Farmington School Board which provided the facilities for the program free of charge.

EIGHT ELEMENTARY school multi-purpose rooms were opened to boys and girls in grades three through six and both junior high gymnasiums were opened to boys of junior high age.

Supervisors handled a total of 5,416 boys and girls during the 12 recreation sessions, Piche said, and provided them opportunities to take part in a wide variety of games and activities. Heaviest activities were at the Shawwassee school where 835 youngsters were handled. Second was Kenbrook school with 729 taking part in activities there during the period.

The FARC feels that the success of this first winter program indicates a strong need for a year-around program and that 5,000 children can be provided this program at a cost of only 42 cent per child.

It is the Commission's hope that local organizations that feel this is a worthwhile program will help financially so that it can be continued next year and also help support the summer recreation program now being planned, Piche concluded.

Ready Changes
In Commercial

Final details of the proposed text of the commercial zoning regulations are being studied by the township board. The board is expected to act on the regulations for the public hearing required by law.

This was reported at the meeting Monday night of the township planning board. The zoning board also has been making a final study of the proposed ordinance.

THE PLANNING group discussed the township grass fire ordinance, and the proposed acquisition of land for fire stations, then withdrew any action until after the election.

The township state highway department was read, answering the plan-board's request for further consideration of alternate routes proposed for the new 21 1/2 Mile Expressway. The state was non-committal, but said full study was being given.

The board has started work on a proposed new zoning ordinance to replace the old ordinance.

Pledge \$535,650 for
New Sorrows Church

Official tallies made following an final report meeting showed of \$9 will function for the next two years. It will handle all Sorrows Church building fund money, and the presentation of the program to new families which move into the parish.

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THE INTERESTIVE campaign, conducted by John V. McCarthy and Associates of Detroit, Catholic financial consultants, was organized on a personal basis with over 500 men of the parish participating actively.

UNDER THE leadership of Joseph P. McHugh, general chairman, and Sylvester J. Phelan, financial chairman, a total of \$54,250 came in from down payments on subscriptions during the major parish-wide fund raising drive. It was disclosed.

The first working phase of the campaign was the memorial gifts solicitation. Under the chairmanship of J. Lawrence Kelly, a total of \$328,510 was pledged for special memorial gifts.

A second phase of the drive saw 20 general phase teams and another \$207,140 in four weeks of active solicitation. Joseph Koehler and William C. Doyle were co-chairmen of this phase of the drive.

IN COMMENTING on the official total, General Chairman McHugh pointed out the value of the two year pledge payment period in enabling so many wage earners to subscribe to generously.

"I feel certain," said McHugh, "that our \$535,650 drive closing total will continue to grow as more and more of the parishioners join the 'building ranks' here at Our Lady of Sorrows. We know many who were unable to subscribe at the time of the workers' visitation, because of illness, but who did signify they would contribute their share to this united parish undertaking."

City Includes
Advisory Vote
On Water Plan

In addition to 12 candidates running for three city council positions, voters in Farmington city will be asked to ballot on a purely advisory measure, to aid the city in planning for the future with plans to join the township in a Water Authority.

The wording of the advisory propositions follows.

SHALL THE City of Farmington join with Farmington Township to secure a Detroit Water Supply at a total cost to the City of Farmington of approximately \$250,000?

Township officials asked the city several months ago to join in creating an authority to get soft water from Detroit mains and distribute this to both city and township, and perhaps other municipalities later.

COUNCILMEN felt they wanted citizens' approval first, and the city's bonding attorney was asked to determine how the city could legally take this step. Preliminary bond issues are involved.

City officials have not pushed hard on the studies, and this has brought charges from township officials and critics this was done for various effects in the coming election.

Pupil Smoking
At Cville to
Bring Penalty

Smoking by pupils at Clarenceville public school will bring suspension, according to enforcement regulations set by the board of education. The new rules are effective today.

There have been various regulations about smoking at the school, and these have been strengthened after recommendations by staff members and parents.

ANY TOBACCO openly displayed by pupils in and around schools will be confiscated. Any pupil traveling to and from school and seen smoking within a minimum radius of 600 feet of school property shall automatically be suspended under normal suspension procedures.

THE PROBLEM involves safety as well as the health of pupils. In recent months other communities have taken strict action on smoking, by city regulation.

Brighton city is enforcing a no smoking rule for persons under 21. The City of Howell followed by city action, and Clinton, Mich., and Livingston County adopted the same procedure with regulation by the sheriff's department.

3 Cars Crash on
US-16 at 9 Mile

Three were injured, one seriously, in a three-car crash on Grand River Avenue at Nine Mile Road last Wednesday evening.
