

Rex Cawley Again Shines, FHS Places 3rd in Huron Relays

The Farmington Falcons gave notice that they will field one of the state's top track teams this season as a result of their third place finish in the Huron Relays at Eastern Michigan College, Ypsilanti Saturday.

Only Flint Northern and Central of the powerful Saginaw Valley League were able to out-point the Falcons. Central took the unofficial team lead with 51 points followed by Northern with 13. Farmington's 28th points was good for third ahead of Pontiac, defending champion.

THE HURON Relays are widely known as one of the Midwest's finest meets. Teams from three states come to compete in the event.

Rex Cawley, the Falcons' All-American hurdler, personally accounted for 11 1/2 of his teams total points with first in the 55 yard high and low hurdles and a fourth in the high jump. Cawley also helped the 880 yard relay team to a third place finish.

Other relay team members were Mike Agee, Roy Jordan and Tom Grimsbach.

Cawley's times in the hurdles of 1:12.4 and 1:12.4, and in the high jump of 4' 10" were the best of the day.

Oakland County Motor Vehicle Tax Collections Up Slightly

Motor vehicle tax collections in Oakland County increased from \$4,691,369.74 in 1957 to \$4,742,109.59 in 1958.

According to an annual report issued by James M. Haro, Secretary of State, the total registrations of all motor vehicles in Oakland County decreased from 232,023 in 1957 to 229,567 in 1958.

An Oakland County breakdown by types of vehicles registered in 1958 shows 220 passenger cars, 23,537 commercial, 1,140 farm vehicles, 3,071 motorcycles, and 1,917 municipal or local government owned cars.

The total number of registrations of all types of vehicles in the county fell \$3,455 below that of last year. The 1957 figure shows 3,578,656 registrations compared with a total of 3,495,171 for the 1958 plate sale year.

This decrease is less than three per cent. Haro pointed out, "Normally, registrations increase each year. The downward slip reflects the state of business we had in 1958."
