Top Edgewood Patroller to Go to Capital

Edgewood school in Clarenceville has been invited by the Automobile Club of Michigan to name its top safety patrol member as Farmington's official delegate to the 23rd National AAA Safety Patrol Rally in Washington, D.C., in May.

The youngster will join 100 other outstanding patrolers from 85 Michigan communities for a four-day, all-expense trip as guests of Auto Club, May 7-10.

The schools were selected by members of our safety consultant staff on the basis of activities and efficiency during the past year as shown in monthly reports.

Ernest H. Davis, Auto Club safety director, said. The schools will choose their top patrolers in the next two weeks.

The patrolers will gather in Detroit, May 7 and entrain for Washington where they will spend two full days meeting and seeing famous and historic sites. Climax of the annual rally is the march down Constitution Avenue of over 30,000 patrol members from across the country. The giant parade, which includes television and movie celebrities, is the largest held annually in the Capital city.

The Washington trip is sponsored annually by Auto Club to honor Michigan's 50,000 safety patrolers for outstanding service to classmates at 2,200 schools. Nearly 2,500 youngsters have made the trip since 1936.
