

Polio Clinic Set For Wednesday

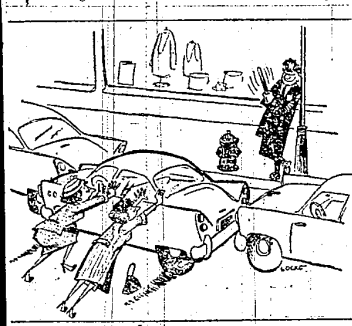
A polio clinic will be held this Wednesday, April 22, from 8 to 8:30 p.m. at the Clarenceville Junior High school on Middlebelt Road.

Higgins Wins 2nd Prize for 1-Act Play in Statewide Competition

The Community Theater Association of Michigan conducted its semi-annual convention in Marshall, Michigan, April 11. The high spot in the convention was an annual award for the best one-act play written by a member of, and sponsored by, a Michigan non-professional theater organization.

Robert Higgins, member of the board of directors of the Farmington Players, who directed their production of "My Three Angels" and who appeared in their forthcoming production, "Visit To A Small Planet," received second prize.

Two other player members, Mrs. Don Briggs and Bill Wilson, had plays in the final judging.

Higgins, a writer with the Jam Handy organization, submitted a one-act play entitled, "The Great Carleton."

As a play it could be classified as typically off-Broadway although its locale is left of Times Square. "The Great Carleton" is a magician who is, historically, from before the crowned heads of Europe. He never loses his dignity, just his professional dexterity as, artistically, his cards scatter and flutter about the stage between the appearances of a too-fleshy

and too-selfish "daughter of the Nile" and the geek who masquerades chicken heads.

Higgins, whose sympathy and understanding for the declining abilities of the Carletons of our world, has given a prospective audience an excellent account of a talent past its prime. Carleton, the magician, is dead. Carleton, the moral of man, exists.

The Farmington Players will present Higgins' play to a closed audience, members and guests, at their regular June meeting. "The Great Carleton" may be presented to the public in the fall should the Farmington Players decide to do an evening of one-act plays, a program which is now under advisement.
