Timely Tips on GARDENING

NATURE'S SCHEDULE

Now is the best time to start the garden. The weather is just what you need. The soil is warm and the plants are starting to grow. The insects are starting to come out. The birds are starting to sing. The flowers are starting to bloom. The trees are starting to leaf out. The grass is starting to grow. The world is starting to wake up. It's time to get out there and start your garden.

and a planting schedule. It is much easier to rearrange a plan in paper than in the garden. If a plan is formulated, the plants can be spaced over several weeks and a harmonious landscape will be produced. It is important to consider the mature size of the material being planted, and to not put the plants too close together. Most shrubs should have about four feet of growing space.

Shade trees should be the first consideration for the planting plan. A well placed tree will frame the house and screen the yard and in uniting the house with the landscape. It will do more than shrubbery to remove the bare look of most properties. Summer leaves will be enhanced by a properly placed backyard shade tree.

The trees selected should be in scale with the house and yard. A tall house needs a tall tree, such as an oak or sugar maple, but modern, low houses call for proportionately smaller trees. The flowering ornamentals, such as dogwood, hawthorn, and flowering crab are ideal. Less commonly used, but equally nice are Carolina silvercherry and yellowwood. These small trees provide ample shade and have the added attraction of flowers in Spring and colorful berries in fall.

REMEMBERS

Plant trees early because they have to mature before the arrival of hot weather—Start annual seeds on sunny indoor window sills.
