Septic Tanks Big Problem

If anyone living in Farmington has a septic tank that has its own field and is working, it does not need to be connected to the city sewer. This point was made at the city council meeting Monday.

So far as septic tanks which empty their effluent into the city and Detroit systems are concerned, here is the history.

THE CITY was in violation some 20 years for dumping sewage into the Rouge branch, and under court order had to get its own sewage disposal system, which goes now to Detroit.

Under agreement when Detroit took Farmington sewage, all septic tanks which emptied effluent into the system were to be discontinued in an orderly fashion this summer. They cause disposal to be poor.

However, the city is not pushing this too hard, except to insist that when a septic tank gives trouble that it then be connected. This is done in the belief Detroit will not push too hard so long as there is reasonable compliance.

Walk Between Westbrooks Gets Airing

A walking footbridge easement between Westbrook Manor No. 1 and the proposed Westbrook No. 3 subdivision, rather than the continuation of Nottingham Drive, is being requested.

Three residents of Westbrook 1 appeared before the Farmington School Board Tuesday night to ask that the Board go along with this plan and make its agreeability to the proposal known to township officials.

The Westbrooks residents expressed the opinion that continuation of the road would result in safety hazards for children walking to the Kenbrook elementary school since they would be forced to walk on the roadway. It was also their opinion that there was no need for continuation of the road to provide satisfactory fire and service road route.

The Board passed a resolution authorizing the administration to inform the township that a 12-foot walking easement and footbridge over the stream would satisfy school needs. Some members of the Board however, expressed the opinion that they felt a continuation of the road might be better from a planning standpoint. They also questioned whether this would present extreme safety hazards for children traveling to and from school.

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Twop. Planning Board Reports Much Accomplished in Year

The annual report of the Farmington township planning board was presented to the board was presented at the annual meeting a week ago, but because of its length was not read to the assembly.

It was a busy and productive year for this township group. Generally, the planning board carried further the overall plan for guidance of growth in the township, with completion of major elements of the township master plan.

All current problems, and preliminary and final plans, studied by the board and its consultants, Wilcan-Leman and Associates. Recommendations are then made to the township board.

EFFECTIVE cooperation with the school board has helped in location of school sites, with provisions for access by streets or walkways through new subdivisions.

During the year the planning board reviewed seven new subdivision preliminary plans, and six final subdivision plans.

THE ZONING ordinance was re-drafted in the last year, and new industrial zoning put in effect in the spring of 1958. New commercial zoning is being considered and a public hearing will soon be set. Market studies indicated an excessive amount of land had originally been set aside for business use, and the proposed new ordinance would aim at correcting this.
