Timely Tips on

GARDENING

BLOSSOM DISPLAY—Spring this year has progressed at an uneven pace, but blossoming has proceeded fairly much on schedule. A few days of exceptionally warm, humid weather forced crabapple, plums, almonds, and tulips into bloom sooner than expected, but when the temperature dropped to a cooler, more reasonable level it was as though the plants had been popped into cold storage. Cool May days prolong and heighten the Spring blossom display.

PERENNIALS—Now is the time for Farmington gardeners to give their attention to the perennial garden. New beds can be developed; old beds renovated and re-worked and crowded overgrown plants divided and replanted.

When planning a perennial border, plants can be included that will provide a succession of bloom throughout the season. Blooming heart and merrillia bloom in May, iris and oriental poppies dominate the garden in early June, and later in the season phlox, rudbeckia, monarda, platycodon and shasta lilies put on their display. There are varieties of day-lily that bloom in May and other varieties that bloom at other times throughout the entire summer.

For a most effective display, four or five of these dependable species should be selected, and groups of them should be grouped at intervals in the bed. Interest is increased if several varieties of the main species are included. Surrounding these dominant plants, plant lesser species that bloom at the same time and that complement and enhance the featured plant.

Iris and poppies combine well with brilliant blue spikes of veronica, and glistening white candle-tuft. Delphinium spires are ideally combined with white or orange-gold lilacs and look charming with airy coral bells.

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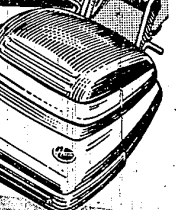
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
