Michigan Week Plans Complete

Michigan Week, May 17-23, is a unique, seven-day promotion campaign, designed to increase knowledge and interest in the state among its citizens and outsiders.

The program is the outgrowth of a series of scattered meetings of interested business and civic leaders in 1950 studying the prospect of state promotion.

The first Michigan Week a somewhat modest affair, was held in 1954. In six years the observance has grown into a giant, festive occasion. Nothing in Michigan joins so many people in a single activity or in the pursuit of a common goal. Approximately 5,000 persons will serve on committees in all 83 counties of the state this year. Some 500 communities will participate. No other state has a similar campaign.

Objectives of Michigan Week are to focus attention on Michigan, its resources, heritage, culture and opportunities to give its citizens a better knowledge and understanding of the advantages of the state in which they live. The 1959 campaign is of particular importance in view of recent unfavorable Michigan publicity.

This year's program will open in communities across the state with special prayers and reference to Michigan Week at church services Sunday, May 17. This is Spiritual Foundations Day. The event will close with the presentation of the Wolverine Frontiersmen Awards on Saturday, May 23, and in other special community events that day and evening.

Between Spiritual Foundations Day and New Frontiers Day are five other days dedicated to some phase of living: Monday, Exchange of Mayors Day; Tuesday, Hospitality Day; Wednesday, Our Livelihood Day; Thursday, Education Day; and Friday, Our Heritage Day.

Takes Part in Helicopter Army Exercise

Marine Pfc. Ronald E. Murphy, son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles E. Murphy of 29707 Ten Mile Road, Farmington, is serving with the Third Marine Division which took part in "Operation Sea Turtle," April 27-30 at Pohang, Korea.

"Sea Turtle" was the largest combined U.S. and Republic of Korea amphibious exercise ever staged.

Helicopter landings were employed in a vertical envelopment assault on the beaches to supplement the landing of ground troops by the traditional helicopter method.

U.S. Marines have explored and developed the tactical advantages of helicopters as weapons in amphibious warfare and ROK Marines have been trained to also utilize the "choppers" capabilities.

Upon completion of the exercise the Division returned to its home base on Okinawa.

Tickets Now on Sale for Big Annual Scout-O-Rama May 23, 24

Between 40,000 and 60,000 persons are expected for the annual, Ottawa District Scout-O-Rama being held for May 23 and 24 on the entire grounds of the John F. Ivory estate.

Al W. Merrow of Farmington, stage show director, made the announcement today, explaining that 50,000 tickets are "going fast" to parents, neighbors and friends of Scouting.

The event includes 35 units—ranging out for the week and providing action demonstrations of Scout crafts, skills and award requirements. Thirty Cub packs are preparing exhibits for display in a tent which measures 40 feet by 280 feet.

To further interest the public all Scout talent stage shows are being rehearsed for the outdoor natural amphitheatre and a special Ivory horse show is being assembled.

Theme of the Scout-O-Rama this year is "Scouting in Action — Outdoors." In previous years, the Scout-O-Rama has been primarily an indoor event with booths and a stage show.

For 1959, the Ottawa District is combining the exhibition with its annual week end camping activity to provide a spectacle of 300 tents, action displays and entertainment.

The 165-acre Ivory estate, at 9990 Cooley Lake Road, was chosen because of unlimited parking facilities, space for many tents and exhibits and general show facilities.

Ivory is providing the estate and all of its facilities free to the Ottawa District.

Others, too, are helping the 3,500 Scouts and Scout leaders in producing the Scout-O-Rama.

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
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


