Darryl Allen, a standout Little League and Babe Ruth League ball player in the Farmington area in past years, really showed the fruits of his earlier training last Friday.

A right-handed sophomore, he hurled a perfect no-hitter for the Farmington High team as the Falcons blanked Van Dyke 7-0 for their sixth win in seven contests so far this season.

THE 5-FOOT, 10 INCH, 170-pound Allen retired 21 straight batters with only two balls being hit to the outfield. Only one batter came close to reaching first on a walk. With the count 3-0, Allen bore down to fan the batter. He struck out 10 in his perfect performance on the mound.

He was given a comfortable lead in the second inning when the Falcons pounded out five hits good for the same number of runs. A sixth inning homer by Gary Tinkie with one aboard made it 7-0.

BRILLIANT pitching by Chuck Thomson a day earlier (Thursday) gave the Falcons their fifth win of the season. They hurled the Waterford Skippers 10-1.

In going the distance, Thomson held the Skippers to two hits.

He got brilliant hitting support from his teammates with Curt Nathan leading the attack. He collected three sacrifices.

Following Sexton and Farmington were Battle Creek with 33 points; Lansing Eastern, 23; Ferndale, 25; and Jackson, 17. Several other class A schools participated but did not score highly.
