The objective of the blood bank program is to supply whole blood and blood fractions to all of you when you need them as well as to supply blood in time of national or local disaster.

What is the job now?—It is to supply 5,000 pints of blood per month for local use and fractions for the armed forces in case of an emergency. Giving blood is simple and painless. It takes less than an hour. After being registered your temperature is taken as a check on this picture.

Why should you become a blood bank member and donor of blood? The reason is simple: to help your own family and others who may need or it's many life saving fractions (gamma globulin, serum albumin, fibrinogen) as well as the armed forces in case of an emergency.

Giving blood is simple and painless. It takes less than an hour. After being registered your temperature is taken as a check on this picture.
