How much do you have in your account? We mean in real blood; the one bank account which should be kept in the Red Cross.

well as your pulse, blood pressure, a blood sample and your medical history. After giving your pint of blood, with no pain involved, coffee and a snack is served and you're back to your normal routine of work or the day again.

Any person in the ages of 18 to 65 who is in good health can safely give blood. Protection of the donor is always considered most important and no one is allowed to give blood if there is any question about their physical condition.

When a person is entering the hospital, a Red Cross nurse or chairman should be notified so that blood can be obtained easily if it is needed. In an emergency the hospital can be notified that the patient is entitled to Red Cross blood. The hospital will then contact Red Cross directly.

Cross and blood derivatives are provided without charge. Hospitals charge only for cross-matching and transfusing.


